Cruise testing will only be stopped by continued public protest. Last year, ACT for Disarmament networked pickets and marches in immediate response to cruise tests in 13 Canadian cities and beyond to Europe and the United States. In Toronto, hundreds marched in a snowstorm to demonstrate their continued concern.

This year the need for protest is even greater. The arms race may not be going away, but neither are we. When you hear the cruise tests announced, call us for protest details.

#### Poland: The Story of Passports and House Arrest

Granting an inhabitant of the Polish People's Republic with a passport is a kind of privilege. By no means is this act a simple right having its source in the fact of Polish citizenship. Granting the passport functions as a prize for good conduct.

To apply for the pass the inhabitant of Poland first has to get an official invitation [from abroad] confirmed by the Polish embassy. Every Polish embassy in the West has special invitation forms for sale. The inviting person has to buy such a form, fill it out, sign material responsibility and send the form to Poland.

If you are a lucky grantee [many are refused passports] you passports are a tool of political get your pass which is accompanied by a special card. This card indicates the country you are going to and how long you intend to stay. All apostasies are viewed as an offence and punished with refusing to issue the pass by the next application. When you come back from abroad you have to immediately return the pass to the police and the same procedure repeats if you want to go away next time. These humiliating and long formalities and the fact that no-one is sure if he gets his pass next time are the main reasons for emigration from Poland.

What is most important are immediately released. repression in the hands of security service. The government claims that all this is necessary to ensure that Polish citizens are not without livelihood abroad. This is obvious rubbish in a country which absolutely does not care about people's livelihood at home.

Many people have been refused their passports for political reasons, because authorities make it a way of controlling the society. We think they should all be regarded as political prisoners affected with a sort of home arrest. We decidedly demand that all prisoners in home arrest in Poland

Since September, hundreds of Innu people have occupied runways at Goose Bay, Labrador in an attempt to stop the destruction caused by low level flight tests and practice bomber runs. The Canadian government now wants to increase the number of tests to over 200 a day and to build the first Nato base in North America on Innu land.

The general membership accepted the offer of the Riverdale Greens because it gives people making major donations to ACT some way of receiving a tax benefit for supporting us. It does not tie us or you to the Green Party in any way.

Now supporters have two options sending a cheque directly to ACT, or sending a cheque to the Riverdale Greens Constituency Association with a memo "for peace education". They will send an equal amount to ACT and you will be mailed a receipt for income tax purposes.

#### What is ACT?

ACT for Disarmament is a non-aligned coalition of activist groups and individuals dedicated to mobilizing Canadians against our country's deepening involvement in the arms race. We began as the Against Cruise Testing coalition in late 1982 and have organized some of the largest demonstrations in Canada. We have since continued to focus on this issue as well as broadening out as Canada's involvement in U.S. military strategy becomes more inextricable.

We believe that peace and ecology are inseparable. Thus we campaign against nuclear power, which fuels the arms race and poisons our environment. We cannot ignore Canada's increasing reliance on this dangerous technology.

As part of the international non-aligned peace movement, we are opposed to the militaristic policies of both superpowers and their military blocs. We believe that peace can only be achieved through the united efforts of people, East and West, working independently of their governments. ACT for Disarmament publicly supports the right of people to work for peace, free from government interference, in both blocs.

ACT strives to reach people in all walks of life. In keeping with our belief that people can bring about change, we concentrate much of our energy on mobilizing people, both by building mass demonstrations and by networking on the local, national and international levels. We believe that sustained, highly public action is the strongest lever we have on government policy and that demonstrations are an effective way of expressing our view in a democratic society.

#### **History of Action**

198:

Feb 12: ACT networks demonstrations across Canada and mobilizes 4000 Torontonians 45 hours after the umbrella weapons testing agreement. Agril 23: ACT organizes the historic anti-cruise march of 25,000 in Toronto and networks Canada's largest day of protest to date: about 125,000 in over 20 cities. Inl. 23: ACT coordinates nationwide (and USI) reaction to the cruise testing agreement - 6000 march up Yonge St in Toronto. Aug. 6: Hiroshima commemoration and protest. Oct. 22: ACT co-organizes a march which again brings out 25,000 in Toronto. Dec. 16: ACT holds a small but significant protest as part of the successful campaign to free independent Soviet peace activist of Iga Medvedkova.

1984

<u>March 10</u>: National demonstrations in response to the first cruise test. ACT had finally won the right to march up Yonge St without a permit <u>April 28</u>: ACT's second annual Spring Peace Protest attracts over 10,000 participants. <u>Aug 6</u>: ACT's second Hiroshima day march.

1985

<u>Ian.</u> Symbolic action marks the first cruise test. "Saturday after" march - over 500 brave the cold. <u>Feb. 19</u>: Second cruise test - nearly 200 people present pictures of their children at a weekday, non-hour protest at PC Party headquarters. <u>April 27</u>: 3rd Annual Peace Protest draws over 4000. <u>Aug. 6-9</u>: ACT's Hiroshima day candlelight march of over 2500 is followed by a 3-day vigil.

1986

Lan-Feb: ACT Niagara & ACT Kitchener-Waterloo join ACT Toronto to protest the cruise tests. April 26: 4000, many first-time demonstrators, join ACT Toronto's 4th Spring Peace Protest. May 11: ACT K-W's Mother's Day March is the largest peace demonstration ever in Kitchener-Waterloo, Age 6-9: ACT chapters hold actions on the anniversaries of Hiroshima and Nagaski. Oct 13-19: ACT's historic East-West peace festival brings together independent peace, ecology, labour & feminist activists from both sides in the Cold War.

1987

<u>Feb.</u>: ACT chapters in Hamilton, Ancaster, K-W, Peterborough, St Catharines & Toronto protest continued cruise testing. <u>April 25:</u> A youthful crowd of 3000 is out for ACT Toronto's 5th Annual Peace Protest. <u>July-Aug</u>: ACT Vancouver holds protests against US warship visits. <u>Aug 6-9</u>; Hiroshima-Nagasaki commemorations.

1988

Lan-Feb: All 8 ACT chapters hold anti-cruise protests in the wake of the INF agreement. Protests are also held in Europe and the US. April 25: ACT Toronto's 6th Spring Protest: 1500 protest in the rain.
