MNSJ VIGIL FOR FEDERAL CAUCUS

A 48-hour vigil and lobby of MP's is planned from 4:00 p.m. on Feb.1st to 4:00 p.m. on Feb.3rd to serve as a constant reminder to government MP's that we will not stand for further cuts to Canada's social programs.

The entire federal Liberal Caucus will be in Metro for a two-day caucus meeting at the Howard Johnson Hotel at Keele St. and Highway 401. The purpose of the caucus is to discuss cuts to social programs, the upcoming federal budget, and the situation in Quebec. METRO BUDGET UPDATE

Despite the opposition of thousands of Metro residents, the Community Services Department net operating budget has been cut by more than \$50 million over the past three years. Metro Councillors have consistently disregarded alternatives to cost-cutting, and as a result many necessary community services have either been eliminated or seriously undermined.

In 1995, the Community Services Department budget is facing either flat-lining, or a possible 5% reduction. The Metro Network for Social Justice is advocating for Community Services to be exempted from flat-lining, and is seeking a reinvestment of funding to strengthen Metro's social infrastructure.

In addition, as Metro and the province begin to explore Greater Toronto Area (GTA) issues, the MNSJ is looking to Metro Councillors for a proactive vision of community services and a commitment to our social infrastructure.

During the 1995 campaign, deputations will be made to the Human Services Committee on Monday, Jan.30th and Monday, Feb.27th. As well, a Lobby Day will be held to pressure Metro Councillors on Friday, Feb.17 at Metro Hall. Throughout the period up to Metro Council's final decision on the budget on Monday, April 10th, we are encouraging people to contact their Metro Councillor to oppose flat-lining and/or cutbacks, and to request a reinvestment into the Community Services budget. Other events are currently in the planning stages and will be announced shortly. "HAVE A HEART" - NYIACC MESSAGE TO MP'S

The North York Inter-Agency and Community Council (NYIACC) is organizing a lobby of North York MP's in an effort to stave off planned cuts to social programs. Their "Have a Heart" campaign is designed to let the federal government hear from the people of North York - know as the "City with the Heart". Kits prepared by NYIACC outline the issues, raise questions, and offer alternatives. The organizers ask residents of North York to fax-phone-write-in to their MP's and to Chretien, Martin, and Axworthy on Valentine's Day, February 14th with the message "don't cut our social programs". SUCCESSFUL FOOD CO-OP INVITES MEMBERS

Karma Co-op, Toronto's oldest non-profit food co-op, has room for new members. Karma carries a comprehensive inventory of health food and standard products, both organic and commercial fresh fruit and vegetables, organic meat, baked goods, cheese and dairy products, free-range eggs, bulk grains, flours, seeds, spreads, dried fruits and nuts. In addition, there is a variety of cleaning, household, and personal care products.

Owner-members are expected to help the co-op function, and there are rewards. A recent price comparison indicated that shopping at Karma is about 29% less expensive than a local major health food store, and 23% cheaper than a predominant supermarket in the area. NEW YEAR'S GREETINGS TO CHINESE & VIETNAMESE


