## **The Peace Petition Caravan** Campaign: already a success!

Thousands of signatures have already been collected since the March 15th kick-off of the Peace Petition Caravan Campaign here in Toronto. Hundreds of volunteer canvassers took to the streets on a door-to-door canvass through rain and shine and will continue to do so until the national campaign culminates on October 20.

Along with the canvassing campaign, the Toronto PPCC organized the city-wide demonstration on April 28, the Peace Festival at Hanlan's Point, and the August 6th Hiroshima rally at Litton Industries to highlight the PPCC objectives.

According to the PPCC national office in Ottawa, hundreds of thousands of signatures have al-ready been collected across

### The Caravan:

Two festively decorated CAR-AVANS WILL kick-off simultaneously on SEPTEMBER 29 from Vancouver Island and St. Johns, Newfoundland. Highly publicized celebrations will begin their three week trek east and west Ottawa on SATURDAY, OCTO-BER 20. They will pass through more than 45 communities collecting the petitions along the way. Each participating town has en-thusiastically agreed to welcome the CARAVAN with its own locally organized, well publicized event and to accommodate people travelling with the CARAVAN.

#### **Caravan hits Toronto** Tuesday, October 16th!

PAND (Performing artists for Nuclear Disarmament) have agreed to host the Toronto Caravan event on the evening of Tuesday, Oct. 16 with a media splash focu ing on a celebration of hope for our children and the future.

#### Caravan reaches Ottawa Saturday, October 20th!

Both east and west CARA-VANS will come together in Ottawa on Saturday, October 20th for a celebration rally where the petitions from across Canada will be presented to the newly elected members of parliament. It is imperative that these representatives realize that our PPCC demands will not be forgotten. Rallies will be held across the country in support of the CARA-VAN's arrival.

#### **Huge rally in Toronto** Saturday October 20th!

In Toronto, the TDN is cur rently organizing a Walk for Peace and massive rally to mark the completion of the PPCC. Thousands are expected to show their support, listen to speakers and festive entertainment. (see below for details) A major mobilization blitz is underway and thousands of posters and leaflets are being printed to build the momentum which should culminate in a powerful and exciting finish to this important campaign.

# **Peace movement shows** strength during election

Brian Mulroney and the Progressive Conservative party were not the only winners of the 1984 election. The peace movement in Toronto and across Canada also scored major gains in raising the issue, influencing politicians and electing a considerable number of pro-disarmament politicians.

The Conservatives' 211 seats give them a huge majority, but no honest mandate to increase Canada's nuclear involvement. Several pro-disarmament PC's were elected and will, it is hoped, keep disarmament concerns heard in the

The debate within the Liberal

party will also continue. Now in opposition the Liberals will undoubtedly revise their policy to differenciate themselves from the new government. Support for such demands as a nuclear freeze will likely come from them in the near future.

The New Democratic Party was the major party with policies most similar to the program advanced by the peace movement and also did well. 30 NDP members will be sitting in the next parliament, most of whom raised disarmament prominently as part of their election campaign.

Although what little was heard of the PC's foreign policy was not favourable, the new prime Minister showed during the election campaign that he does respond to pressure from the peace movement and he feels that pressure both from outside and inside his own party.

# Petitioning accelerates!

The PPCC petition gathering goes into high gear during September and October. Our emphasis shifts from the important (but slower) work of door-to-door canvassing into higher profile street and workplace petitioning. With this strategy we should add thousands of names to our petition and thousands of participants to the October 20

In addition to supporting an international Nuclear Weapons Freeze, the PPCC petitions calls for the following domestic disarmament action:

- We ask that the Parliament of Canada act to refuse the testing of the Cruise missile in Canada.
- We ask that Canada be declared a Nuclear-Weapons Free Zone. We further ask that wasteful spending on the arms race be diverted to fund human needs so as to ensure prosperity through peace. Finally, we ask that the above-stated objectives be subject to ratification through a "free-vote" in the Parliament of Canada.

### Election continued

The peace movement election activities were focused primarily on candidates at the riding level. This strategy seems to have paid off, causing a great deal of response and public dissension from candidates whose positions do not correspond to their parties' policy. These breaks with policy are in turn affecting future dis cussions within those parties and

in the country at large.
In Toronto this riding-focused strategy saw lobbying, independent peace campaigning and allcandidates disarmament meetings organizied on a large scale. TDN member and supporting groups had a great deal of success organiz ing these meetings. Groups participating included the Spadina Peace Group, Trinity Peace As-sociation, Markham Concerned Citizens for Disarmament, North York Action for Disarmament, York North Peace Group and the East York Peace Committee.

All meetings were extremely successful some attracting up to 400 people with local, and in some cases national, media attention.

Other TDN activities focused on highlighting the Peace Petition Caravan Campaign and support-ing the Election Priorities Project. Two public PPCC protests or-ganized for Brian Mulroney stops in Toronto, let the new Prime minister and voting public know the Peace movement was concerned by his lack of discussion of the

The peace movement proved during the election that it is definitely a force to be reckoned with in Canadian political life. It did not elect a pro-disarmament par-liament but this was never on the agenda for this election. The plans were to influence and educate candidates, and raise effectively disarmament issues for public debate in this key period of political activity. It is no exaggeration to say that the goals the peace movement set itself were far surpassed, with peace becoming one of the major issues and one of the few to receive international attention.

The task before the movement now is to continue to build its parliamentary and extra-parliamentary strength. The peace movement has proved it wields considerable political influence. With continued organizing it can translate that support to where it can move beyond being influential to become, in fact, decisive in Canadian political life

## Mass Phone Tree underway

The TDN is now organizing a phone tree system designed to inform thousands of people every month about major activities of the peace movement in Toronto. While we have already recruited hundreds of people to work on the phone tree we hope to increase its size dramatically in the months ahead.

The phone tree works very simply: the TDN office will call the Co-ordinators with information to be relayed. Each Co-ordinator will relay this information to 5 callers who in turn relay the

message to 5 Receivers.

This phone tree differs from others because of its size, and its attempt to reach beyond the core of the movement, and its follow up system to ensure its proper functioning.

The phone tree will operate no more than once a month and will be used only to relay information about major events and emergency responses. We will be recruiting people for this task by distributing phone tree cards at our major events. If you are interested in participating please contact the TDN.

## **Peace and Solidarity** movements find common ground

During the summer, some very important meetings took place between the TDN and members of the solidarity community in Toronto. The worsening situation in countries such as Nicaragua and the threat of increased intervention by the United States prompted the discussions. It has become apparent in the course of the meetings that the two movements share other concerns and that it would be beneficial for both communities to integrate some

The first discussions centered on political analysis. While opinions differed, it was apparent that there was much common ground.

There was an agreement that joint activities should be planned without a formal coalition.

Specific discussion for common action in the near future has centered on activities planned for United Nations Disarmament Week (October 21-28). A dance on the night of the October 20 Walk for Peace will be organized by the solidarity groups and sup-ported by the TDN. An educational night highlighting the connection between the peace and inter-vention issues is being planned for October 25. Future meetings are planned and are open to all who are interested.
