I saw that we would have to put aside the petty fears that divided us, and learn to live as true brothers and sisters in a loving way. I saw that we would have to find others who shared our hearts' direction, whatever their racial background, and join with them into groups that always remembered that our purpose was to be instruments of the Great Spirit's will, and helpers to our Earth Mother. I saw that such groups could greatly effect the cleansing of the earth that is now

Sun Bear

The Bear Tribe Medicine Society is a group of people striving daily to re-learn their proper relationship with the Earth Mother, the Great Spirit, and all of their relations in the mineral, plant, animal and human kingdoms. The Bear Tribe is based upon the vision of Sun Bear, a Chippewa medicine man. We are a tribe of teachers responsible for sharing with others those lessons of harmony that we are successfully learning.

Our camp is located on fourty acres of land outside of Spokane. Washington. In the four years that we've been here we have constructed a longhouse in which we live, our sweat lodge, several cabins, a root cellar, a granary, a barn, animal accomodations, and storage sheds. A greenhouse, and additional housing and office space are in the planning stages. We have about ten acres in pasture, and we have planted several gardens. We have horses, cows, goats, chickens, rabbits, dogs and cats.

Each year we have several hundred people come to visit with us. With them we share our knowledge of Native American philosophy, earth awareness, and country living skills - gardening, building, food preserving, wild plant identification and use and animal care. Visitors are expected to work with whatever is happening while they are here, and to abstain from drugs, alcohol, negativity and violence. We request a \$7 per day, or \$45 per week donation from visitors.

Since 1975 the Bear Tribe has been recognized as a nonprofit, education and communications society. Besides having people visit our home we give four-day Self Reliance Seminars, and three-day Preparing for Vision seminars. Sun Bear, Wabun and some of our other members spend a good amount of time on the road lecturing and giving workshops and private consultations to individuals wishing to learn how to better balance their energies. Visits for those wishing private consultations are also available at our home, at a different rate from that charged people coming for work visits.

We publish MANY SMOKES, a Native and new age quarterly now in its eighteenth year. We also publish Sun Bear's BUFFALO HEARTS and THE BEAR TRIBE'S SELF RELIANCE BOOK. We distribute other books, Native crafts and tipis, and we help people find land on which they can settle. Our goods and services are covered in this catalogue. We hope that you enjoy reading it, and that it might be the first step in new folks getting to know us better, and old friends keeping up with our new activities. If you have any questions, drop us a line. Please enclose a stamped, self-addressed envelope, and be patient. We get a lot of mail.

# THE SELF RELIANCE CENTER



The Bear Tribe's Self Reliance Center exists to allow contemporary people to better understand their relationship to the earth. At the Center, people of any age, of any race, may come to learn how to walk in a good balance with each other on the Earth Mother. Activities are designed to allow people to experience their oneness with each other, the Earth Mother and the universe. They are also designed to teach people the skills that they need to be self-reliant on the land.

During your stay at the Center, you will learn these skills by working alongside the members of the Bear Tribe. You will attend talks on the traditional Native way and philosophy, prophecy, practical skills, plant identification, healing, male and female energy, and relationships. You will participate in traditional prayers, sweat lodge and pipe ceremonies, and you will hear and discuss legends and stories about the traditional way.

#### THE TALKS

Talks on the traditional Native philosophy, Native prophecies for these times, relating to the Earth Mother, male/female energy, relationships, and forming communities will largely be given by Sun Bear and Wabun, his medicine helper. Talks on herbology, holistic healing, and practical skills for living with the land will be directed by Bear Tribe members most experienced in these areas.

#### WORK PERIODS

Part of what we have to teach is a properly joyful attitude toward work, whatever it is. During work periods people may learn this, as well as skills that will help them to live with the land.

#### SCHEDULE

Self Reliance Seminars last four days. We ask people to arrive by 9 a.m. on the day they begin, and to stay through dinner on the fourth day. While activities vary, depending on the season, and the people attending, our general schedule is talks in the morning and evening and work periods in the afternoon.

#### THE FACILITY

People attending the seminars will live in tipis or tents. Indoor space is available on a limited basis for those who need it. Accomodations are on a first-come basis unless you have special needs we know about beforehand. Most housing is dormitory style. You are free to bring your own tipi or tent.

Meals are shared in our longhouse. Our food is natural whenever possible. While we are not vegetarian, we try to accommodate those who are.

Bring sleeping bags, pillows, towels, good footwear, a flashlight, any munchies you want, clothes, musical instruments, a pocket knife. Nights can be cold, so dress accordingly.

Don't bring alcohol, drugs, violent or negative thoughts or feelings. DON'T BRING ANY DOGS OR CATS. We have four of each already in residence, and city animals often hurt the other farm critters.

#### DATES

In 1980 seminars are available: June 5-8, July 17-20, July 31-August 3, and September 4-7.

#### COST

The individual rate for this seminar is \$75 per person. People wishing to stay longer may do so, at \$7 per day donation. This includes the cost of the talks and other activities, and room and board.

#### TRANSPORTATION

Spokane is serviced by most major airlines, buses and trains. The Center is located 35 miles from Spokane. We provide transportation to and from town for \$7.50 per person each way. Please notify us in advance of your arrival time. If you are coming by car, let us know and we'll send you a map.



## PREPARING FOR VISION

Vision is the force that can provide your life with direction, purpose and meaning. Many people today sincerely desire to seek their vision so they know how their lives can best serve the Great Spirit and the Earth Mother. This seminar is designed to prepare people to seek their own vision.

In the old ways the vision provided the central direction to a person's life. While each person was expected to participate fully in the life of the tribe or the society, they were also expected to fulfill as much of their vision as possible while people sometimes strayed from the path of their vision, they were always expected to return to it if they wished to be whole, complete and fulfilled human beings.

Vision can come to a person in a variety of ways. You can experience a complete vision - one that brings to total understanding - while awake or asleep, or you can experience smaller visions which, taken as a whole, give direction to your life. This seminar will help you to recognize and accept vision in any way that it comes to you.

It will also give you the spiritual foundation you need before going to seek your vision. It includes instruction in the use of the pipe, a sweat lodge ceremony and personal counselling. Beginning on the Sunday of the seminar, participants may also spend one to four nights and days alone on our land, fasting and seeking their vision.

#### **SCHEDULE**

This seminar begins at noon on Friday. There are talks Friday afternoon and evening, and Saturday morning. Following lunch on Saturday, people fast to prepare for the sweat Sunday. During this time private counselling takes place. After the sweat people are placed on the land to experience seeking a vision.

#### COST

The cost for this seminar is \$75.00.

# EARTH AWARENESS: WALKING IN BALANCE

Through their talks on Earth Awareness, Sun Bear and Wabun help individuals and groups to realize how they can actively support the life system of the planet. To help our Earth Mother, we have to come to the realization that each of us is an integral part of the planet, that our actions affect the whole earth. We must realize that for us to become holistically healthy persons, we must give some attention to the healing of the earth. While recycling and nutritional awareness are essential, effective personal ecology must go much deeper. It must penetrate our hearts as well as our minds. It must help us to come into balance with the earth, all of

the other life forms on her, and with ourselves.

During Earth Awareness seminars Sun Bear and Wabun also discuss traditional Native philosophy and religion, prophecies for these times, earth energy, female energy, the Medicine Wheel, the Circles of Life, visions, forming communities, and becoming self reliant.

Through talking, feedback, exercises, quiet times, questions and answers, Sun Bear and Wabun will help ou to find out how you can help the earth, and your own future, at this crucial time.

Earth Awareness seminars can be done as evening lectures, weekend intensives, or midweek intensives. They can be sponsored by any interested parties or groups.

#### THE MEDICINE WHEEL

This introduces people to the native way of learning about yourself that came to Sun Bear in a vision. In Medicine Wheel seminars you will learn about basic Native philosophy, and about the Earth Astrology, a way of self-knowledge that can help you to relate better to both the people around you, and the earth. Through learning of your birth and progressed totems, clans and directions, you will learn where you have been and can travel on the circle of your own life. You will also learn how to construct and use your own medicine wheel.

The Medicine Wheel is available as a one-day or two-day intensive, or as a midweek seminar.

#### MAKING MEDICINE

This program covers basic Native philosophy and prophecy, earth energy, female energy, vision, community, ceremony, song, dance, Native healing methods and ceremonies, healing through the Medicine Wheel, and healing through breathing, massage, meditation, nutrition, exercise, herbs, and flowers.

Making Medicine is available as either a weekend or mid-week intensive, or as a

#### EARTH ENCOUNTERS

The purpose of Earth Encounters is to make you feel good about yourself, each other and your mother, the earth. We want to help you take off your blinders and see what is always around you - the amazing beauty, bounty and love. During this largely experiential seminar you will experience sensing the wonders of the earth that are always around you. You will locate a power spot. You will open up to your relations in the mineral and plant kingdoms, and learn how to express gratitude and respect to them. We'll discuss vision, and things that may block you from having it. You'll experience another way of dealing with your fear, pain, anger and confusion, and you'll



learn how to feed your fellow humans with the abundant love and beauty that is always around you.

Earth Encounters are weekend intensives which begin Saturday morning and last through Sunday afternoon. Ideally, they are presented in natural settings. They, too, may be sponsored by any interested group or individuals.

#### COST OF SEMINARS

Generally, a weekend intensive or midweek intensive costs \$55 per person if participants pre-register, and \$65 at the door. Weekend intensives which extend into the following week cost \$95 preregistered, and \$110 at the door. The cost for evening lectures varies depending on the requirements of the sponsoring organization.

We are willing to work on an individual basis with sponsoring groups concerning finances, although we do, of course, have to be sure that our expenses and time away from our Center are covered. We do try to set up any long distance tours so that we can go to several places at one time, which helps to cut down on the expenses for the sponsoring organization.

None of the prices above include room or board. Sponsoring organizations are welcome to make their own plans concerning these.






