Mxists understood by state capitalism only the independent eso enterprises of the state itself. When the reformists dreamed of overcoming capitalism by means of the municipalisation or governmentalisation of ever greater nos. of transports and industrial enterprises, the Marxista used to reply in ratusation this is not socialism, but state capitalism. Subsequently, however, this concept acquired a broader meaning, abegun to spet to all the varieties of state intervention into economy; the ruse the word etaism (statification) in this sense.

But Urbahns not only expounds the travails state capitalism —he appraises them after his own manner. In so far as it is generally possible to understand him, he pronounces the regime of state capitalism to be necessary a, moreover, a progressive stage in the dev. of society, in the same sense as trusts are progressive compared with the disparate enterprises.
