In the campaign of 1892 a No. Populist who made 63 speeches for Watson was threatened with lynching. 2000 armed wh. farmers, some of whom rode all night, responded to Watson's call for aid & remained on guard for 2 nights to avert threat of violence Q TW, p. 44

~~The cumulative weakening of resistance to racism expressed by decision of US Supreme Ct. 1873-1893, & in 1883 it virtually nullified restrictive parts of Civil Rights Act. In 1896 it approved plan of Mississippi to deprive N of franchise. IN SAME YEAR~~

~~US PLUNGED INTO IMP. ADVENTURE--Adventures in Caribbean & Pacific brought 8 mil. of colored races under rule of US. Doctrines (p. 55) of Anglo-Saxon superiority by which Prof. Judd W. Burgess of Columbia U, Cap. Alfred T. Mahan of US Navy, & Senator Albert Beveridge of Indiana justified & rationalized Am.~~

~~Imperialism in the Philippines, Hawaii & Cuba differed  
in its essential from the race theories by which Sen. Bej. R. Tillman of SC & Senator Jas K. Vardaman of Miss justified wh. supremacy in the So. BOSTON EVENING TRASCHRIPT, 1/14/1899 admitted So. race policy was "now the policy of the Adm. of the very party which carried country into & thru c.w. to free the slave" AND IN 5/10/1900 editorialized "No men... no longer denounce the suppression of the N vote (in the So) as it used to be denounced in reconstruction days. The necessity of it under supreme law of self-preservation is candidly recognized." (Q also p. 56)~~

~~250 slave insurrections. Slave power made & unmade presidents. KM: & kept slave "the meanest and most shameless form of man's enslaving recorded in the annals of his." (CW in US, p. 24). Degraded 8 mil. Whites to condition only 1 degree removed from chattel bondage--Cal. was admitted as free state by fugitive slave bill became law--part of Compromise of 1850. In 1859 JB with band of 21--"Rev. of 1860"--Rep Party elected Lincoln--slave power lost its control over nat'l govt. Shot at Fort Sumner, 4/12/61 EP "ALL PERSONS HELD AS SLAVES SHALL BE THEN & THENCEFORWARD EXEMPT & FOREVER FREE". Andrew Johnson restores all rts of property except slaves to confederates--which meant restoration of vast lands to plantation owners.... State conventions held in So. & 2nd pres. decree--meant shameful black codes forbidding Negro to own land. Miss. refused to ratify 13th amendment--In Dec. 1865 Bourbon So sent to Senate & House, v-p of Confederacy, 4 confederate generals, 5 confederate colonels, 6 confederate cabinet officers & 53 confederate congressmen--KKK rode through So--Negro peoples conv. called for halt to Johnsonian reaction. Basing themselves on 1 of the pro-slavery compromises in original~~

Constitution - in era of slavery so state counted 3/5  
in apportionment. After emancipation rebel  
states voting Rep. tho they disfranchised large sections of  
black 14th Amendment compromise as Stevens did not  
insisted in making voters rather than population basis of  
Rep. 14th Amendment did declare no state may deprive  
one of life, liberty or property - ratified in 1868.

Reconstruction Act - 2/6/70 martial law in So to sweep  
away usurpation of ex-slaveholders; Johnson vetoed  
bill House overrode veto by 136:43.  
A Federal Civil Rights Act also was passed "there shall be  
no discrimination in the civil rights or immunities among  
citizens of any State or Territory of US on acct o race,color  
or previous condition of servitude..." Johnson vetoes;

Congress overrode veto -- Then 15th amendment prohibiting  
disfranchisement

Stevens introduced bill into Congress Mar 1867 to confiscate  
great landed estates of leading confederates & divide  
among tillers of soil. Each freedman would receive 40 acres  
& \$50 for homestead. Holdings under 200 acres would remain  
untouched.

Impeachment invoked for Johnson's suspension of Edwin M  
Stanton Sec of War, member of Radical Republicans despite Tenure  
Office Act. Case opened 3/13/67 -- 6 mos. later came Pres.  
elections & Grant won. There followed Radical reconstruction  
in which N & W legislatures brought to So for 1st time  
UNIVERSAL MANHOOD SUFFRAGE, FREE PUBLIC EDUCATION, EQUAL  
POL. & CIVIL RIGHTS FOR ALL CITIZENS.
