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It all boils down to the fact that one gets a more objective view from ~~the~~ Menshevik history of The Russian Revolution of 1905 by Solomon Schwartz. It is true that has its own inadequacies, especially in claiming the true proletarian representation for Menshevism and the slanderous combination of anarchism and dictatorship for Lenin; but at least we see Lenin on the question of revolution, as "very nearly Trotskyist". Here they are:

1) On p. 24 there is the Lenin quotation from June-July 1905 article "Two Tactics of the Social Democratic Revolution".

2) Sept. 14, 1905: "From the democratic revolution we shall at once begin to go on ... to the socialist revolution. We are for continuous revolution and we shall not stop half way." (It is this LT quotes in the History of the RR Vol. I, Appendix 2.)

3) Relating a successful revolution in Russia to a socialist revolution in Europe.

4) Sept. 24, 1905, (Oct. 10) Regarding the "revolutionary democratic dictatorship of the prol. and peasantry.": "we shall make the Russian revolution the prologue to the European socialist revolution."

5) In a "Communication About the Third Congress of the Russian Social-Democratic Party": "By being victorious in the impending democratic revolution, we shall make an enormous strike toward our socialist goal: We shall free Europe fr

all Europe from the ~~reactionary~~ heavy yoke of the reactionary military state... and with the aid of the socialist proletariat of Europe, we shall be able not only to defend the democratic Republic ~~but also~~ but also to move toward socialism in seven league strikes." (This is from Collected Works, Vol. 7, p. 405)

(6) And from Vol. 10, p. 73-77, in the article "Stages, Direction and the Prospects of the Revolution", Lenin listed six stages and in the sixth stage, when you move to the socialist revolution, it was heavily based on the 1848 and 1871 revolutions, and it was in that, that Lenin used the expression "The European Proletariat will show us how it is done." Though this was written in the 1905-6 period, it hadn't been published until 1926 in the Lenin Miscellany, Vol. 5. However, the essence of this is seen in the Foreword Lenin wrote for the second 1907 edition of his Development of Capitalism in Russia.

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IT in The History of RR, Vol III, p. 382, after he quotes Lenin 1905 on continuous revolution, says on p. 383, "If you throw aside episodic accumulations, polemical exaggerations, and individual mistakes, the essence of the dispute about the question of permanent revolution from 1905 til 1917 reduces itself, not to the question of whether the Russian prol. after winning ~~the~~ power could build ~~nationnally~~ nationally a socialist society... but to the question whether a bourgeois revolution is capable

following quote is from p. 316 or from p. 471): "Whoever ~~had~~  
~~had~~ made a great revolu-  
tion, knowing beforehand, ~~knowing~~ how to carry it through? ...  
"belatedness of the rearming" ... And yet LT also quotes re-  
garding Lenin's speech to Swiss workers on the 1905 revolu-  
tion that "Russian revn" "can be a prologue to a world-  
wide socialist revolution," and even here, p. 476, on Lenin's  
April 4 thesis, LT quotes himself in 1909 attack against  
the Bolsheviks.
