Dear Raya,

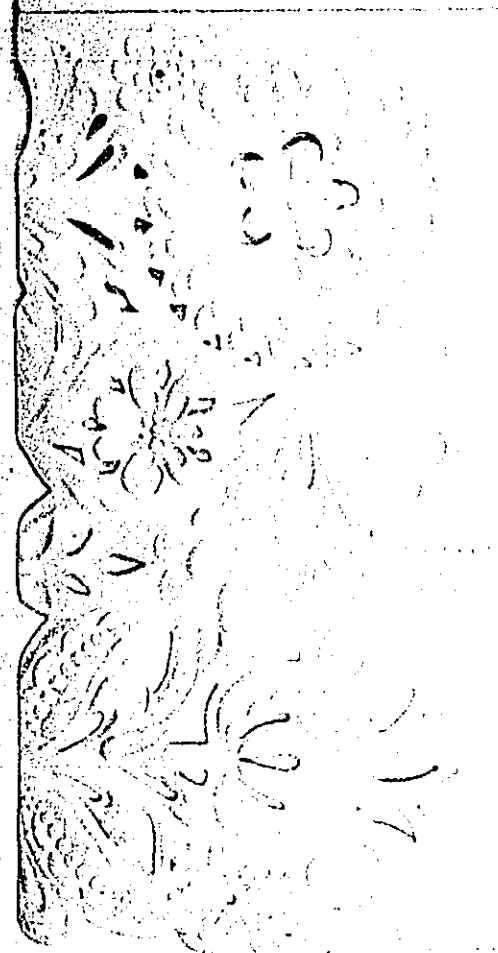
Thank you for your review of my book. You certainly gave it a great deal of attention for something we like you to basically disagree!

Which is why I did not comment on your note 2 months ago re my review of your work on Marx and Culture. I learn a great deal from Ideas opposed to mine and since News & Letters is a popular paper, I do hope it has also helped in the sale of book while I'm still grappling with your latest an Owl of Minera.

Glad you liked meeting my colleague, Kevin Anderson, whom you met at HSA Conf. and I would indeed feel honored if you reviewed my Rosa Luxemburg, Women's Liberation and Marx's Philosophy of Revolution where, for the 1st time I even returned to Marx before he broke with class full and was writing his doctoral on Epicurus. That that was done when my pre-occupation is the final decade of Marx's life has more than a symbolic importance -- it rounds out Marx as intellectual whose greatest love remained Hegel's 2nd negativity.
