

REGIER PUPILS STRIKE DESPITE PEACE EFFORT

**Many Absent from School
Sessions; Arrests Made.**

A few minutes after board of education officials had proclaimed the pupils' strike of the Regier school a failure yesterday afternoon the leaders of the movement met and voted to continue the walkout.

The strike, which had been planned for several weeks, was called in the morning. It was in the form of a protest against Miss Mary E. Tobin, principal of the school, who was accused of being harsh with the students.

Arrests followed the ringing of the school bell at the morning session. Bernard Well, 1258 West Roosevelt road, whose daughter, Bernice, has not been in school for five weeks, was arrested. With Mrs. Rose Gutmann, 1910 West Taylor street, he was speaking to a group of students in a vacant lot a block from the school. A flavor fired with policemen, snorted up to the open-air meeting. The young men fled, but Well and Mrs. Gutmann were arrested. They were charged with disorderly conduct.

deering Jads Caught.
A short time later the nimble heels of Harry Kandiebaum, 1327 South Halsted street, and Gilbert Puert, 102 South Washburne avenue, proved a second too slow for the bregans of two copperheads and the jads took a ride in a patrol wagon. They had been lurking at students who passed into the school building. Kandiebaum is a graduate from the parental school for boys, and will be sent back there, school officials say.

The morning session was well at-

tended. But between pupils were absent, according to William Lester Bodine, head of the compulsory education department of the school board. In the afternoon session fifty-two students were absent!

"But there are many reasons why these students are absent," Mr. Bodine said. "Perhaps they are sick, or their parents are sick."

A meeting of the junior section of the Young Workers' League, the pupils' organization, was scheduled to take place at 4:30 in a hall at 1103 South Loomis street. At the appointed hour

fifty pupils were in the hall. The leaders had a difficult time maintaining order. Many of the strikers came on roller skates and there were many spats and fistfights among the members.

Few to School.

"The committee has reports that the strike was much more successful in the afternoon session," one of the strikers asserted. "Only two pupils were in the eighth grade this afternoon. Our movement is gaining strength. The committee has voted to continue the strike."

There will be pickets on the job at the school this morning, the leaders

said. Well remained in jail last night. His wife refused to permit truant officers to take her daughter to the afternoon session. Bernice has been refusing to attend school for five weeks.

"We will prepare charges against Well and his wife under the compulsory education law at once," said Mr. Bodine.
