Introduction

If you are not content to leave the major decisions of society in the hands of others, The Connexions Directory of Canadian Organizations for Social Justice may well be something you've been looking for.

The Connexions Directory is proof that all across Canada there are people like you who refuse to accept the inevitability of injustice, violence, and alienation. It lists over 1,500 groups that are actively involved in the struggle for a better society. Looking through these pages, you may be astonished by the incredible variety and amount of work that is being done to foster justice, peace, and a sense of community.

This directory, the first of its kind in Canada, grows out of the work that we at Connexions have been doing since 1975. We are a non-profit organization with a decade of experience in education, publishing, information sharing, and networking among groups and individuals working for social justice. We have discovered that people concerned with social justice often have trouble getting the information they need, or have trouble using this information because it is not organized effectively. The result can be wasted time, duplicated efforts, and missed opportunities to profit from other people's experience, research, ideas and support. We have attempted to alleviate this problem through the Connexions Digest of Resources and Groups for Social Change and now through The Connexions Directory.

The Connexions Directory is a powerful tool for finding out about groups that are working on a wide range of social issues, including the environment, peace, native rights, equality of women, rights of minorities, health, education, and the economy. When you read the directory, you share the experiences, strategies and visions of over 1,500 organizations. You will find a multitude of uses for the directory, including:

- · locating films, speakers, publications and other resources
- · finding people who share your interests and goals
- identifying groups that might help you with a particular initiative
- · compiling mailing and telephone lists

To be truly useful, the information in this directory had to be organized effectively. For this reason we have divided the groups into general subject areas (such as Health, Peace, Environment) and have included several indices at the back that let you search for information according to geographical location, name, or more specific areas of interest (see Keyword Index). We have also included listings of alternative periodicals, and other directories. If there is any way we can make the directory easier for you to use, please let us know.

In addition to its immediate practical value, the Directory will also help to produce the more intangible benefits that come from increased contact and knowledge. As one looks through this Directory, a sense emerges of the power and vitality of the urge to create alternatives. We see that despite the pervasive feeling that "nothing can be done", people do join with others to block what they see as harmful and fight for what they consider to be desirable and just.

We hope that this directory will be a means of encouraging people to examine the similarities and differences between our various struggles and strategies and in so doing to develop a greater understanding of how seemingly different issues and problems often have common root causes. By sharing and reflecting on information and experiences, we contribute to the process of creating movements and networks for change. If the Connexions Directory contributes to this process, it will have served its purpose.

At the same time, the Directory is not a finished product. We intend to produce a new edition annually, and information in it will be updated quarterly in the Connexions Digest. To make the Directory as complete and up-to-date as possible, we need your help. Please let us know of any information or sources of information which you think would make subsequent editions more complete, and please give us your comments and ideas on how to improve it and make it more useful.

Check the Keyword Index for the terms describing the area of your choice. Organizations are listed alphabetically under these terms, followed by their entry numbers. Using these entry numbers, refer to the appropriate subject chapter, where information on organizations is provided.

Turn to the Name Index. Using the entry number following each name, refer back to the appropriate subject chapter.







How the governments of Canada helped

To assure Canadians the information a free and independent people need (given our small, spread-out population and powerful foreign competition), successive governments over the past century have gradually built a structure of postal, tariff and tax-related incentives and supportive measures.

And they have worked! Today Canada has a healthier magazine industry than ever before, with some 5,000 periodicals for people of every interest and location. But it's a fragile industry: At last count more than half of Canada's periodicals had circulations of fewer than 2,000 copies per issue, and only 110 periodicals had circulations of 100,000 or more per issue. Foreign publications still account for 77% of all English-language newsstand sales.

The threat to your magazine

The Government in Ottawa is now threatening to treat Canadá's magazines as if they were so many widgets. It's threatening to eliminate the postal, tariff and tax-related incentives and supportive measures...to dismantle the very structure that past governments have worked so hard to build and maintain.

The Government in Ottawa is threatening the survival of the majority of Canada's magazines and considering measures that will significantly raise the cost to readers of those that survive.

Canada's magazines tell us about outselves. They're a voice of our own. If the current Government in Ottawa were to treat Canada's magazines as if they were just another product, it would diminish (or even silence) that voice forever.
