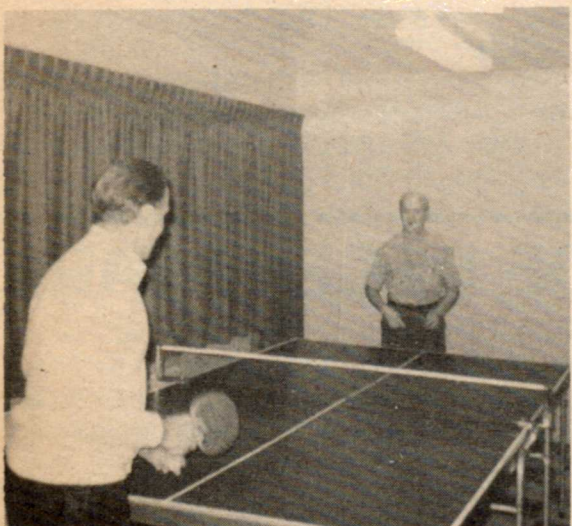

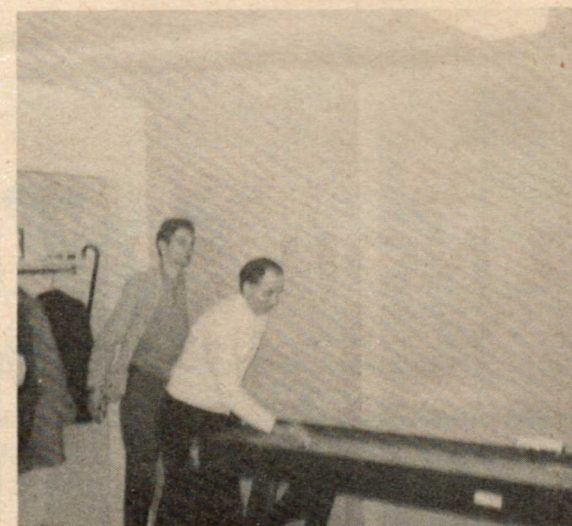

WHAT IS THE PROCEDURE FOR TENANTS WHO ARE IN ARREARS OF RENT? UNDER WHAT CIRCUMSTANCES DOES A TENANT RECEIVE AN EVICTION NOTICE? WHEN A TENANT GETS BEHIND IN RENT FOR VALID REASONS, ARE MONTHLY PAYMENTS TO MAKE UP ARREARS ACCEPTABLE?

First of all, we are sure all tenants are aware of their obligation under the terms of their signed lease agreement that rent is due on the first day of each calendar month.

Should a tenant be unable to pay current rent for valid reasons, arrangements to pay same are possible providing the tenant immediately contacts their respective Area Supervisor. Naturally a tenant's previous history of rent payments and history of keeping agreements will be taken into consideration before any new agreement is made.

If a tenant has been issued with a Notice to Vacate owing to arrears of rent, you can be assured that Area Staff have exhausted their efforts in attempting to collect arrears by other methods.

Should a tenant wish to remain in tenancy, arrears of rent at this time should be paid in full. If a tenant fails to pay rent arrears in full and remain in possession of the premises, the Corporation may then find it necessary to proceed with the necessary steps to obtain a Court Order for possession.

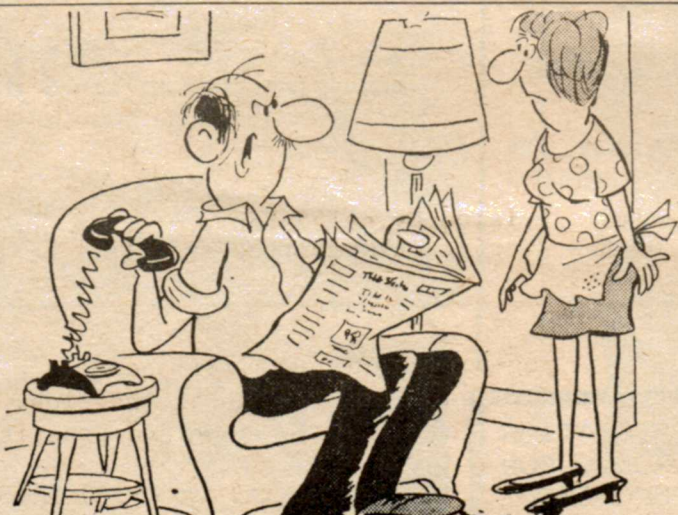
If and when a Court Order of possession is obtained, the servicing and action necessary is then carried out by a Sheriff of the courts.

This type of action can be best avoided by contacting and co-operating with your Area Supervisor at the time your rent payment is in default.

It is hard to believe that almost a year has gone by since I was elected President of the R.P.C.I.A. However at the February Tenants Meeting it will be time again for nominations. It is not too early to start thinking about whom you would like to see on the Executive of our Association.

The CBC radio has shown considerable interest in our Rent Brief. They did a three minute tape with us in November and on Thursday, January 18th they will do a two hour taping which will be made into 2 or 3 half hour programs. We can all be proud of the impact our Brief has had.

Funding at this moment is indefinite but applications are now into O.H.C. and C.M.H.C., Canada Manpower and the Provincial Government.

The Executive is also proposing a giant lottery for all organizations in Regent Park and this should result in some funds to carry on the R.P.C.I.A. Whatever the outcome of our applications I am sure the Association will continue to function for the tenants of Regent Park.

I feel there should be some communication on this matter between O.H.C. and the Association.

I would like to welcome Al Whittal into the community. He is working with the staff at the Teen Centre now that Barry Tulip has left.

I would especially like to thank all those who worked so hard to make the Children's Christmas Party a success; as well as the organizations, companies and local merchants who contributed.

Some Facts About Children's Aid In Regent Park

THE CHILDREN'S AID IS ONE OF THE MANY SERVICES SPONSORED BY THE SERVICE UNIT.

First it might be interesting to turn back the pages of time to the year 1872. When law was first instituted in the U.S.A. for the protection of animals, and strange as it may seem, a child was brought before the courts under that law, who was considered to be in need of protection.

The present agency stems from what was know as the Infants Homes of Toronto originated by a committee of women in the year of 1875 to care for and protect children and unwed mothers. In 1887 John Kelso, a globe reporter and humanitarian, determined to alleviate the distress he encountered daily on Toronto's streets, organized the Toronto Humane Society to protect children and animals alike, from cruelty and a abandonment. This dual function proved impractical, and in 1891 the Toronto Children's Aid Society was incorporated with Mr. Kelso as President. In 1951 these two pioneering organizations amalgamated to form the Children's Aid and Infant's Homes of Toronto. Volunteers for the most part were responsible for the work that was carried on and not until 1923 was the first social worker hired on a full time basis. In the year of 1957 the organization's jurisdiction was extended throughtout Metropolitan Toronto and at this time the name was changed to The Children's Aid Society of Metropolitan Toronto.

Since I became an employee with the agency in November 1971 I realize that one of the greatest concerns of the public is the function of the Children's Aid Society.

Occasionally we hear of a family or parent who will say, "I don't want to become involved with the Children's Aid, they just want our kids."

The public on the whole, as I see it are not aware that any child, taken from his or her home must be brought before a judge, in a court of law, to determine whether or not the child or children, were really in need of protection.

Facts and figures indicate that the average child, who is unhappy in the school setting and having problems with the school curriculum is often from a home trying to deal with one or many problems.

As adults my wife and myself were involved with the Children's Aid, in foster care for children in 1957. The first two children we cared for returned to their parents at the age of sixteen. At that time there was a great demand for foster homes, and we cared for children from the new born through all ages.

We have resided in Regent Park since 1965 and have a family of three - two boys and one girl - ages eleven through nineteen years. My work with the agency has brought me closer to my fellow tenant. Honestly speaking the number of residents who have questioned my integrity and confidence has been almost non-existent.

Teen Age Gangs: What Can Community Guardians Do?

WHAT CAN BE DONE ABOUT GANGS OF YOUTH CAUSING A DISTURBANCE OR LOITERING IN THE BUILDINGS IN REGENT PARK?

This question is one which concerns a large percentage of tenants residing in Regent Park. It is a problem that is time consuming to attempt to resolve, but nevertheless, one which we continuously strive to control.

As in the case of the question that appeared in last month's issue of the Regent Park Community News, it is herein repeated, there are no obvious answers to the complex problem. It may appear that an obvious answer is to remove the youth from the buildings. This approach is not a lasting solution to the problem. Working in and with the Community, would it not be better to seek alternative measures to improve the situation?

In the case of the specific complaint of youth Causing a Disturbance, the Community Guardians officer attends the scene and finds out what is happening. He determines important factors: The age of persons involved? The nature of the disturbance? Is a Criminal Code offence or Provincial Statute offence occurring? Do the offenders live in the building or area? Is parental involvement required? Is police involvement necessary? After consideration of all aspects a decision on the course of action is arrived at. The officer may disperse the youth with a caution. He may effect an arrest if he finds a criminal offence being committed. He may note the names of persons responsible and contact the parents re seeking their assistance in dealing with the responsible parties. He may, if he did not witness an offence, request a tenant who did see an offence, to volunteer the information and attend as a witness so appropriate action could be taken.

The old saying "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure" should be remembered when discussing this type of a problem. As youth are going to be with us for a long time, should we not attempt by all means at our disposal to inject in them a sense of responsibility not only to themselves but to the Community in which they live?

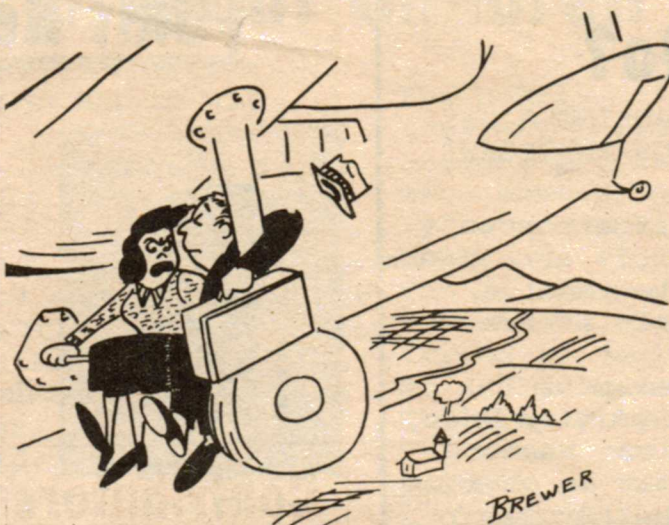

1 onion chopped
 $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. salt
 $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. pepper (black)
3 tbs. curry
 $\frac{1}{4}$ cup cooking oil
4 cups cooked rice

Combine onion, black pepper, salt and curry, sprinkle over meat and mix together. In large skillet heat oil. Separate mutton from mixture and brown both sides of meat. Cover and simmer until half cooked. Cover mixture from meat and when meat is half cooked add mixture and continue cooking until tender on a medium heat. Serve with rice.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

For those who dislike the taste and texture-but like the price-of liver, the following is an excellent disguise. It also makes the liver go further.

Fry one pound of bacon, crisp and save the grease. Then grind in a meat grinder one pound of liver, any kind, and one onion. Then add one or two eggs and the cooked crumbled bacon. Drop by the spoonful into the bacon grease and fry like hamburger patties. These are called bacon patties as there is very little liver flavor left. Try it and see.

I suppose most families like cookies! But at 59¢ a dozen, if not more, is getting out of hand. Try something cheaper. Get one can (5 oz.) of Chinese noodles and one package of sweet chocolate bits. Melt the chocolate in a double boiler and pour it over the Chinese noodles, mix together and spoon out on wax paper. It makes a nice cheap cookie and good also. Makes about two or three dozen. Butterscotch bits may also be used.

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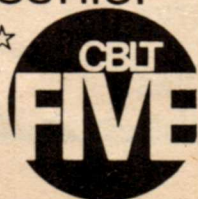

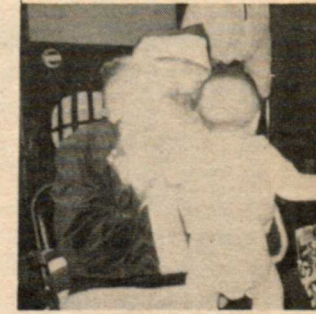

Letters to Editor

I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for the December issue of your newspaper. Certainly it is continuously showing signs of progress and you are to be commended as to the fine work you are doing, and we hope that the standard you have set will continue as we look forward to seeing bigger and better things from the paper. At this time I would like to comment on one statement that was made on your front page attributed to Mr. David Rotenberg. Mr. Rotenberg indicated that he supported municipal grants to the Salvation Army and the Teen Centre in Regent Park. I would like to clarify this matter. This probably is quite correct that Mr. Rotenberg supported municipal grants to the Salvation Army but not to the Salvation Army in Regent Park.
