
OHC Task Force on housing meets in Regent Park

PLEASE CLARIFY THE PROCEDURE TO BE FOLLOWED BY TENANTS IN CASE OF FIRES? DO THE FIRE ALARMS CONNECT TO THE FIRE DEPARTMENT? WHO HAS THE AUTHORITY TO TURN OFF THE ALARM IN CASE OF FALSE ALARM? WHO HAS THE AUTHORITY TO RESET THE ALARMS?

Fire alarms are not connected directly to the Fire Department. However, in South Regent Park an indicator is located in our heating plant. The duty engineer immediately calls the Fire Department should an alarm sound.

No person has the authority to switch off the alarm until after the Fire Department have responded to the call to determine whether in fact there is a fire. After clearance, the alarm may be switched off by either our security or Corporation staff. However the resetting of the alarm is carried out in both North and South Regent Park by the duty stationary engineer.

SOME TENANTS WHO HAVE RECEIVED NEW FUSE BOXES STATE THEY DO NOT UNDERSTAND HOW THEY WORK. WHAT CAN BE DONE ABOUT GIVING THE NECESSARY INSTRUCTIONS?

The new fuse boxes are relatively simple to operate and certainly far more economical. Should a fuse blow, the switch type fuse breaker will trip to the OFF position. To reset simply switch back to the ON position. However, if in doing so it should again trip to the OFF position, please check household appliances to ensure the circuit is not overloaded or applicances shorting out. If you are sure there is no overloading or shorting and the switch will not stay in the ON position, please telephone our "TENANT ENQUIRY BOARD" - 925-4841. Do not attempt to remove the breaker switch.

From the Desk
of the

President - Neil Tanner



As you can see on the front page the Task Force of Ontario Housing Policy will be meeting in this community February 22nd. On behalf of all tenants I will be presenting our Rent Brief at this time. Our recommendations which ask for rent to be based on no more than 20% of net income are supported by many other tenant associations and I hope that they too will have representatives at this meeting.

Recently we had a request for 100 copies of our Brief from the Warden Woods Community Council who will be meeting with Stephen Lewis their MPP on February 14th. Their president, Mrs. Clare, wrote "I am sure a tremendous amount of interest will be shown especially by people like ourselves who are immediately affected by the contents and it is the hope of our community that you will have success with this Brief and that most, if not all, of your recommendations will be implemented in the near future."

Edwards G.L. Jones, President of the D.D. Summerville Association wrote:

"At our January general meeting of our tenants association which comprises 160 suites it was unanimous that we concur with your rent brief in its entirety. Therefore, we would respectfully request that your good association place us on your list, giving support to this, our common cause."

We have also recently received the wholehearted support from Alderman Chisholm, Chairman of the Committee of Urban Development, and Alderman Dan Heap. This of course is in addition to endorsations we already have since our Brief was published in October.

Thus we can see that we are not alone when we say that rents in Ontario Housing are too high. I urge every tenant to come out to the meeting on February 22nd. at St. Cyril's Church. Rents as well as many other matters concerning housing will be discussed.

Henry Francis and a group of tenants presented a brief to the Parks and Recreation Committee at City Hall, Feb. 1st., requesting funds to operate the Adult Recreation Centre. With a grant it would be possible to hire a small staff and to offer better programs to the adults of this community. The reception was favourable and we are hopeful that some money will come our way.

COMMUNITY GUARDIAN - -

CAN HE ARREST?

WHAT ARE A COMMUNITY GUARDIAN OFFICER'S POWERS AND AUTHORITY WHEN A CRIME SUCH AS BREAK AND ENTER OR Serve. It tastes THEFT TAKES PLACE IN A PROJECT?

> If a Community Guardian Officer, while on patrol in a project, actually finds someone breaking into a place OR committing a criminal act such as theft, he can arrest that person without a warrant and his authority to do so is stated in Section 449, Subsection 2, of the Criminal Code of Canada.

> It should be remembered that Community Guardian project Officers are not working in projects for the sole purpose of making arrest, but rather, are there to assist and protect tenants and, hopefully, to prevent crimes from happening. It is not Community Guardian's intention to replace your police department, but rather, to support them as they carry out their responsibility of protecting the lives and property of all

citizens. The Criminal Code is the guidebook to all person engaged in keeping the peace and protecting citizens. All citizens have certain powers of arrest, but they differ from the authority provided in the Criminal Code for security officers, and they in turn differ from the powers and authority provided for Police

Officers. The Criminal Code spells out the powers and authority for each of these groups.

If you observe something occurring which in your opinion appears to be wrong, phone your Police Department and your Community Guardian officer.

DR. BOONE SUPPORTS COMMUNITY HEALTH CLINIC

Dr. S.S. Boone was raised in Sudbury. Attended University of Toronto for pre-medical and medical training. Graduated in 1970 and interned for one year at St. Joseph's Hospital.

He has been with the Services Unit since September 1972. He feels that there is a great need for a clinic in the area on a full-time basis. "The sooner a clinic is built in Regent Park, the better," said Dr. Boone,

the better," said Dr. Boone,
"I hope that as many of the residents as possible get involved in the care and upkeep of the clinic when it is built (hopefully sometime this year).
Only then can the community feel that they have a part in the running of a Community Health Centre."

Dr. Boone is at the Services Unit, 70 Pashler Ave. every Friday morning from 9-12. Any tenant in Regent Park may make an appointment to see him by calling - 863-1768. Dr. Boone will see patients whether or not they have OHSIP cards.

## DOWNTOWN SCHOOL HAPPENINGS

## PARK SR. SCHOOL

The staff and students of Park Senior School are planning a series of camping trips for all interested students, late next spring (from mid-May until the end of the first week in June.) They will go in groups to Camp Mazinaw, north of Belleville, or to Camp Kitchikewana on Beausoleil Island in Georgian Bay.

These educational trips are planned to expand the interest and experiences of our students. Exposure
to first hand experiences of the
Canadian outdoors will help our
children to grow more completely
and to develop an awareness of
Canada as a country and their own
identity within their country.

In a community such as Park School we feel that a group camping experience can lead our children to realize their own capabilities and the need for each person to bear his share of the load. It is important for our children to have an opportunity to build close relationships with one another, which can only be achieved by a group living, working and playing togeth-

er, twenty-four hours a day for a period of time.

Both camps conduct classes in the science, geography and history of their respective regions. This will enable our girls and boys to put to more practical use their reading, research and other skills learned in the school situation. In addition the pupils will have the opportunity to participate in the usual camp and recreational activities of hiking, swimming and boating.

Each pupil who goes will contribute to the project by helping on one of more of our many money mak-

ing plans, such as bake sales, candy sales, etc. In addition, we are asking each pupil to make a direct financial contribution, if

possible.

The staff and pupils are working hard to raise the required funds for this project. In addition we are seeking help from interested people and in business who are willing to help a group of boys and girls who are able to help themsel ves.

## **NOVEL AFTER-SCHOOL PROGRAM AT PARK SCHOOL**





Park School Children's Program Centre is an after school type program that began December 4th, 1972. Twelve local young people, who live in Regent Park, were-given L.I.P. grant for \$36,504.00.

The regular daily program is conducted in three unused portables in Park School yard. Activities include an Arts and Crafts program, a Model Making Club; an Active Games Room as well as Out-Trips. We have a six team Cosmo Hockey House league at Regent Park Gym and an All-

Star team which plays against other Centres.

Daily attendance in the rooms which are open from 3-9:30 p.m. - Monday thru Friday, should be looked at on an individual basis. For instance at 3:15 the Model Club has 25 children, at 7 p.m. they have 20.

But through the evening 100 different children make a model. Generally speaking all the rooms have the same attendance pattern. The Games Room can serve 50 children at any one time but again over 100 different children a night. The Arts and Crafts program also attracts over 100 different children a night. We find an equal number of boys and girls attend and that the 9-11 age group predominates.

We have at this time insufficient time in the Gym. At the moment we are attending Regent Park School for gym activities but hope to be able to have other gym programs, especially for the girls, in the near future. Apparently the agency programs have cornered all the permits.

Our Out-Trips program began last week with four overnight stays at Camp Norval. We took 4 groups of 8 boys with two staff in attendance. We hoped that this low-child-staff ratio would lead to better staff-child relationships. I cannot say whether or not this was achieved, but the kids had a hell of a good time.

WHAT ARE THE GROUNDS FOR SUSPENDING A STUDENT FROM SCHOOL?

The regulations of the Board of Education governing suspensions state, "it is the duty of the principal to suspend a student who is guilty of (a) persistent truancy; or (b) flagrant opposition to authority; (c) habitual neglect of duty; (d) the use of profane or improper language or (e) conduct injurious to the moral tone of the school, and to notify the parents or guardian of the pupil and the Board and the inspector."

As you can see from the vague nature of these grounds a great deal is left up to the interpretation of the individual principal. Gord Cressy and I are concerned about this and I have had a sub-committee struck to attempt to set out a proper procedure that all schools will follow prior to the suspension of any student. This will mean that every alternative will be tried before a youngster is suspended.

WHAT CAN MY TRUSTEES DO FOR ME?

We can be of help in three areas:

- (a) At the Board by making sure that issues important to inner city families get top priorty.

  (like a greater emphasis on reading and the basic skills)
- (b) In the Ward by attending various Home and School Council meetings to work with you on the changes you want in your local schools and by holding meetings of the Ward 7 Education Forum whenever important matters (such as Budget priorities) come up at the Board and we need to know how you want us to vote on them.
- (c) On the Hotline we realize that some things are too personal to be brought up at large meetings and yet often you need to talk them over with someone who knows a bit about the education system. If you have tried to work it out with your local school and not been satisfied give us a call on the Education Hotline 921-4404. It will be answered either by a trained resident who will hold all conversations in strict confidence or by the answering service who will relay your message to your trustees.

### Oak Community School is very much alive



OAK STREET COMMUNITY SCHOOL

The citizens who originally sparked the interest i having a community school have been working hard we the Toronto Board of Education, The Province, Parks and Recreation and Metro Social Services and are now at the stage where architects plans for a shared use building will be presented to the citizens for their approval. A meeting of representatives from the community was held in Oak Portable on Tuesday, January 30th, for this purpose.

The plans will be discussed at that time and copies are being sent to each resident in Regent Park so that everyone can see what we are doing and share with us

in the planning.

At the site itself Oak Community Citizens Group conducts a mother and child group, Arts and Craft group and a Teen Centre Drop-In under a L.I.P. grant. Information about these programs can be obtained by calling - 863-0358. In addition to these programs the site is used for citizen meetings by people from the "Oaks" and by the Oak School Workshop Group which is studying education in schools in order to begin programs now for the new school concept.

The site is also used by "Contact" an alternative high school providing credit courses in secondary school subjects for young people who have dropped out of school (for information call Harry Smaller at 537-2194 or 759-5250) Another program going on is leadership training for those citizens involved in the project. This course is given by Robert Hart and will help us in preparing in carrying out new school programs and making it possible for us to take part as a community in the school as it develops. The principal, Les Birmingham is now working with us. He is becoming aware of the needs of the community by getting involved. Les is available to all of us and is willing to try and be of help where ever he can. His main job will be working for us at the Board level and getting our request through and in carrying out the building programs which we hope will start this spring. In addition he sponsored our LIP grant programs and with us will be preparing curriculum, planning and hiring of staff for the new school. Les believes strongly in "community involvement" participation and shared decision making and is anxious to work with everyone under these conditions to build the best school we can.


