Ontario Task Force Hears Tenants At St. Cyril's

Neil Tanner President of the Regent Park Community
Improvement Association presented a Breif to the
Ontario Task Force on Housing Feb. 22nd at St.
Cyril's Church. The main point of the Brief is that
rents be based on 20% of net income for all tenants
including those on assistance (i.e. 20% would be
of the total cheque including the shelter allowance

The Task Force then questioned the audience for clarification of certain points in the brief. Mrs. Helvi Therien, Chairman of the Rent Brief Committee, pointed out 60% of the people in Regent Park wanted to buy their own units. When a member of the Task Force said, "he felt that the shortage of housing must be taken into consideration, and that there was a shortage of

labourers Mr. Frank Macdonald, a former building construction supervisor, replied, "that he found it strange, that a million dollars a day could be spent on fighting a war but no money for housing, that given a week notice he could fill St. Cyril's Hall with skilled labourers (It is interesting to note that there is never any answers or questions asked when statements as above are put on the floor) Sheila Holmes, of the R.P.C. Service Unit answered two questions from the Task Force on how the rent structure was administrated by various government branches regarding those receiving assistance.

Jerome Murray made a strong plea for a better deal for those on assistance, basing his case on documented facts. Budd McCormick disagreed, stating that any help given to those on Government Assistance would cause bad feelings by those who lived out side the projects.

Betty Ann Roth, President of the Moss Park Tenants Association read a statement in support of the R.P. C.I.A's rent brief. Larry Soble, spoke for Alexander Park, reading a survey which proved the RPCIA's rent brief and supported it. Many more people spoke on maintainance, management, security, etc. The Chairman of the Ontario Advisory Task Force on Housing thanked the people for turning out, and complimented Neil E. Tanner, of the RPCIA on the most informative and well thoughtout brief received to date.

ALDERMEN SUPPORT LOWER RENTS

MARCH 1st, THE URBAN RENEWAL HOUSING & FIRE LEGIS-LATION COMMITTEE OF THE TORONTO CITY COUNCIL UNANI-MOUSLY ENDORSED THE RENT BRIEF WHICH ASKS FOR LOWER RENTS FOR ALL TENANTS IN OHC PROJECTS. HELVI THERIEN INTRODUCED THE BRIEF AND A VERY GOOD DISCUSSION FOL-LOWED WITH ALDERMEN AND TENANTS. CONSIDERABLE INTE-RESTED WAS SHOWN IN HOMEOWNERSHIP FOR OHC PROJECTS.

PROMPTED BY THE BRIEF ALDERMAN ARTHUR EGGLETON WILL PROPOSE MORTGAGES GEARED - TO-INCOME AT THE MARCH 14 COUNCIL MEETING.

THE ALDERMEN WERE IN AGREEMENT THAT 25% OF GROSS INCOME IS TOO HIGH AND ENDORSED THE PROPOSAL THAT RENT SHOULD BE NO MORE THAN 20% OF NET. THE BRIEF WILL NOW GO TO CITY COUNCIL FOR ENDORSEMENT.

From the Desk

of the

President - Neil Tanner



(FROM NEIL TANNER'S SPEECH TO TASK FORCE MEETING AT ST. CYRIL'S - February 22nd.)

I wish to thank the Task Force for the opportunity to to present the Rent Brief prepared by the Regent Park Community Improvement Association. I hope that the submissions made to the Task Force don't end up gathering dust on a shelf as so often happens. This is not the first time that Briefs have been presented asking for changes in the Public Hosing rent scale. Our Association presented its first proposals to the Hellyer Task Force in November 1969, requesting that rents be no more than 20% of net income. At the time a very good brief was also sumbitted by Michael Audain to Robert Andras, the Minister respon-

Michael Audain to Robert Andras, the Minister responsible for housing. Many of his proposals are included in our Brief.

In April 1972 at the request of numerous tenants a

Face to Face discussion with representative from OHC, CMHC., elected representatives and tenants was organised by the RPCIA and close to 300 people attended. The same questions which tenants have asked over again were asked again - "Why are rents based on gross instead of net pay?" - "Why should rents be raised when the wife or teenagers go out to work?" - "How can a family on welfare make ends meet when 30-35% of the welfare cheque must go for rent?" "How can the working man ever get ahead if his rent goes up every time he gets a raise and only a one year lease is permitted?".

The people in public housing are tired of discussions that don't bring results and we promised the tenants at this meeting that we would follow through on their proposals and would continue our discussions with OHC until a better and fairer rent scale was worked out. The Association prepared the Brief which we hope, all members of the Task Force have read. Since we were anxious to make the Brief as representative as possible we invited tenants to participate in a discussion of the draft. It was very gratifying that over 100 people participated in that meeting and that only one person voiced opposition to the proposals. One of the main concerns in the many discussions we have held is that most of the newer projects such as St. Jamestown, Moss Park have much better conditions and facilities and yet we pay the same rent scale Some consideration we feel must be made for the deterioration of the buildings after 20 years. Not only that but gas and hydro are also included, in other projects, whereas in Regent Park tenants pay their own.

It is obvious that there is a great deal of agreement both in and outside of public housing that changes are long overdue. It is about time that the Provincial, Federal and Municipal governments sit down with the tenants to revise the Rent Scale accordingly. The people in public housing are tired of being studied; tired of being told by the Federal government that it is the Provincial government's responsibility, and by the Provincial government

TENANTS IN NORTH REGENT PAY GAS AND HYDRO - TENANTS IN SOUTH REGENT PAY HYDRO DNLY - WHY IS THIS SO?

The rent scale in a project is determined by the services supplied. Both North and South Regent Park apartments are on a rent scale which includes the following lease components: heat, hot water, water, stove refrigerator and T.V. antenna. Tenants in both projects are responsible for their own lighting and cooking expenses. If a tenant has electric appliances, the cost of cooking will be included in their electricity bill. If appliances are gas such as in North Regent, the cost of cooking will be handled by the gas company and hydro bills will include lighting only The reason for this being each unit has an individual meter for gas and hydro.

IN THE PAST YEAR OHC WENT TO CONSIDERABLE EXPENSE TO FIX UP THE "INTERCOMS" IN THE HIGH RISE BUILDINGS. THESE ARE NOW DISCONNECTED ENABLING ANYONE TO ENTER THE BUILDINGS. MANY TENANTS ARE UNHAPPY ABOUT THIS SYSTEM. DOES NOT THE "OPEN DOOR" POLICY CREATE MORE VANDALISM AND MORE EXPENSE FOR OHC?

We would agree the intercom system is not being utilized at the present time. However, we are sure tenants are aware of the present elevator strike which has now been in effect approximately six months. Owing to this, it has been necessary to leave the side exit doors open to permit entry in case of elevator breakdown. This practice nullifies the use of the intercom system. When the strike is resolved which we sincerely hope will be in the very near future, the use of the intercom system and whether tenants would wish the system used on a 24 hour basis or evening and nights only will be discussed with the RPCIA at our Advisory Committee Meeting immediately after the strike is resolved.

SOME TENANTS REPORT DAMAGES DUE TO WORKMEN'S NEGLIG-ENCE AND THAT THEY HAVE NOT BEEN REIMBURSED. ARE CON-TRACTORS INSURED AND IF SO WHY SHOULDN'T THE TENANT BE ABLE TO CLAIM DAMAGES?

Contractors are insured and tenants have a right to claim damages. If tenants experience such negligence, they should contact the Tenant Enquiry Board at 925-4841 and their Area Supervisor immediately. Any delay in reporting such negligence makes it difficult if not impossible for the Corporation to intercede on the tenant's behalf.



NEIL TANNER for President


Last year I was honoured to be vour President. I worked for the tenants of Regent Park to the best of my ability. It is you who will judge my performance in the up-



WEIGHT-LOSERS BANANA FLIP



WHAT IS A COMMUNITY GUARDIAN?

Community Guardians are a group of selected individuals who are employed by Ontario Housing Corp. to provide security. Community Guardian came into being as a result of tenants in Regent Park requesting a more specialized, in-depth security service. The Community Guardian patrols the project with a view to preventing criminal acts from taking place. When he attends the scene of an incident he attempts to resolve problems. He is a person who is aware of what is happening in the community and is, what might best described, a "Resource Person" to the tenants. If he cannot assist in solving a problem, hopefully he may refer the tenant to appropriate O.H.C. management officials and other agencies who can provide assistance. The Community Guardian is there to assist and, with the assistance of tenants, prevent incid ents from happening. If, however, a criminal offence is witnessed by an officer, the officer is obliged by law to take positive action to apprehend the offend-

er(s) and prevent the continuation of the breach of the peace. This of course does not mean that an officer would not attempt to help the individual even though he may be forced to arrest him. He is involved to a large degree with the young as they appear to require the most attention.

In the early stages of our involvement in Regent Park there were misunderstandings as to the role of the Community Guardians officers in the community. Under the auspices of the Regent Park C.I.A., your president, Mr. Neil Tanner, a committee of interested tenants was formed to deal with the problems from time to time, arise due to misunderstandings. The committee of tenants, Community Guardians and other interested parties, meet monthly and together work for the betterment of the project.


