

### ACTION TO STOP "SNIFFING"

#### Requested by Regent Park Parents by Eugene Demers

On Monday Feb. 21, a special council meeting was held in the Regent Park United Church to discuss the problem of drugs and solvent sniffing in Regent Park. A capacity audience filled the basement hall.

The Reverend A. Verrall of the Regent Park United introduced the four panelists, Budd McCormick past President of the R.P.C.I.A., Don Roache President of the Canadian Union of Public Employees, Laurie Shugarman of the Addiction Research Foundation and Dave Martin from the Teen Centre.

Mr. McCormick affirmed that although there was some drug addicts in the area, the problem involved mostly sniffers of glue or other solvents. "We do not have a massive problem in Regent Park."

Mr. Roache agreed that Regent Park was not the only area with this problem but nevertheless it is very serious and he charged the organization has not done anything about it despite several conversations with Budd McCormick.

The report by caretakers and foremen complained of the risk to bodily harm when a caretaker was hospitalized by three "high" kids.

Dave Martin said "I know all the kids and the problem is not

as serious as claimed by Mr. Roache".

Laurie Shugarman suggested that "There is no more a solvent problem here than anywhere else in the city." She reported that the Ponds Company have responded by removing the harmful ingredients from Cutex. She also pointed out that Canadian Tire sells over 100 products which can be used by sniffers and it would not be possible to remove all these from the market.

Many people felt Mr. Roache should not have put Regent Park in

the headlines when the problem is universal.

It was suggested that a strong committee and a great deal of publicizing of the ill effects might be a start. The parents should supervise their children not damn them.

Barry Tulip appealed for more support to 203 Sackville Green as he felt that providing stimulating activities was one of the best

ways of coping with the problem.

Others stated that a clinic is necessary for treatment and that support from public representatives is needed to implement an effective program.

Janet Ross a staunch enthusiast appealed for more drop-ins and asked "Where are the parents! Why don't they help."

Dan Peace suggested that the Boy Scouts Organization could help and would like to work with the Teen Centre.

It would seem that involvement, interest in youth, the need for a clinic and more drop-in centres with more activities to attract idle youth are necessary. It is incongrous that parents who know the problem are not at the meetings to express their views and offer suggestions. The world is involved in this problem, but we are morally bound to contribute something to its solutions.

## A parents view

Budd McCormick has recently charged that solvent sniffing in the Regent Park area has not reached any high proportions and dismissed evidence of Don Roache, President of the Canadian Union of Public Employees. I also speak as one who has seen evidence of youngsters sniffing solvents having worked with the Addiction Foundation in this community in the summer of 1970.

Teenagers turn to "sniffing" for many different reasons. Sometime it is because friends of their own age do it. Others try to experiment. Disillusion, boredom and a general state of disgust with society as a whole are other factors. Some turn to solvents because they are much cheaper than other drugs.

I found that teenagers were not able to
quit even though they
had full knowledge of
the harmful effects.
After protracted use
of solvents stomach
cramps set in when
they tried to quit and
breathing became difficult and laboured.

One group which I personally observed found that they reached a 'high' then became quite violent. When the Cutex was removed a cooling off period set in. It is a medical fact that the residues in solvents constrict the nerves and insufficient oxygen reaches the brain. Solvent sniffing can cause break down of brain cells, liver and spleen damage. Inflammation blocks the nasal passage and windpipe causing dryness and can result in frequent suffocation.

The ideas and feelings of the younger generation must be un-

derstood. They simply cannot identify with a lot of the values of their parents. They live and feel differ-

ently than we adults. They seem to have a sense of urgency about the issues confronting their present and future lives. They feel that computerized advancements prelude individualism of spirit and initiative. In short many see society as it is and frankly do not like it one damn bit.

Within the group of solvent sniffers I talked with I found a common theme. They turn to it to escape the problems which confront us all. Some who went for treatment found that with tranquilizers they were able to withdraw. Some felt that if adults could get "stoned" to relax than why not them.

The teenagers themselves know they have a problem but when they want to talk about it they are told by some that religion alone is the answer, or that they are crazy. Others receive a beating or are threatened with police. But all they are asking for is help. If you do extend your hand it should be fully understood that they are putting their trust and faith in you. Break this bond by any of the above means and you have lost the battle which you are trying to help them to

Anyone who states that there is not drug or solvent abuse in our area is not in my estimation too well informed or is trying to make an issue of it. This is not a problem that is autonomous within any specific district it is national in scope. As a result of the pressure the manufacturers of model Cement have been working on an additive which will make the potential sniffer vomit from the

I write not as an expert but as a parent who is deeply concerned about the youth in our community.
