

## REGENT PARK HEALTH CLINIC ON THE WAY

CLINIC AT 15 BELSHAW WILL BE OPEN DAILY AND THREE EVENING A WEEK.

After four years' hard work, the dream of the Regent Park Community Health Clinc is finally being realized. On August 28th a "Wall Breaking Ceremony" to initiate the renovation of three apartments at 15 Belshaw Pl. took place.

Mrs. Margaret Scrivener, MPP, broke the 'wall' officially. Naturally the credit for the success of
this project goes to the tenant committee nominated for this project by the tenants of Regent Park
This Health Clinic will be serviced by two medical
doctors, six registered nurses, a dentist and a
physiotherapist. The dental clinic will operate
on a full time basis. Pre-natal, post-natal care,
mental health care and home care are also planned.

The Clinic will be open mornings, afternoons and evenings, so that all the members in a family can get the doctors services. An emergency service will be available during the week-ends.

Mr. Boundy, co-chairman of the Tenant Committee for the Health Clinic informs us that:

-after the start, tenants will have an opportunity to elect members on various Boards on a standing system with a retirement plan after a length of service.

-a special meeting of all tenants will be called before the opening of the Health Clinic and a report given by the members of the staff to explain the services of the Clinic.

-"the Grand Opening" will be announced well in advance to all the tenants.

-as far as possible the job openings at the clinic will be advertised in the Regent Park Community News for the benefit of all tenants. Tenants will be given preference

## TENANT MANAGEMENT PROPOSAL TO BE PRESENTED TO O.H.C.

A very exciting proposal is being submitted to OHC on behalf of the tenants of Regent Park. The details are to be found in Face to Face column on this page. You will notice that Mr. Rose's proposal is that the RPCIA undertake to participate in management in a number of areas has been considerably modified. The Management Committee which had many meetings over the summer felt that the RPCIA should get into management more gradually and is proposing that we undertake three responsibilities only - Unit Reps, Tenant Management Board and Tenant representation in OHC offices in Regent Park.

One point I would like to emphasize is that the RPCIA will not negotiate in any areas which come under union

jurisdiction.

Another important point is that the RPCIA will not request funds for the Association (co-ordinator, secretary, office expenses, newspaper, etc.) as it is felt that the independence of the Association must be maintained. The contract will cover management, services and fees only.

Tenants participate in management in many projects in the U.S. but only one project in Canada, Little Rock, B.C. has made any progress in this area. Tenant participation in management, is in my opinion the only way we can effectively solve the problems that have plagued our community for so many years. We are committed to the principles

-that it is desirable that tenants have some control over events and decisions affecting them.

-that it is in keeping with the democratic process that tenants have this opportunity to participate in management of their project.

I sincerely hope Ontario Housing is committed to these proposals as well.

I was very proud to attend the National Convention of the Public Housing Tenants in Quebec City over the Labour Day weekend. I was one of 250 delegates who represented 400,000 public housing tenants across Canada. One of the aims is for uniform rent scales across Canada with grievances procedures for tenants It was a great experience for me and I will report in more detail at the October Tenants Meeting and in the next issue of the paper.

#### LANDSCAPING BEGINS IN NORTH REGENT

In the month of August the Lakeshore Landscaping Associates began the landscape improvements for stage IA. This phase of the Regent Park Improvement Plan consists of construction of a wading pool and entry courts adjacent to the North Ice Rink. The construction of four entry courts in the vicinity of the swimming pool. The redevelopment and improvement of the Senior Citizens area and adjacent playground. Also included in these three areas are extensive tree and shrub planning.

The aim is to have most of this completed before the cold weather sets in. Final touches will be done in

the spring.

Final drawing are now being prepared for State 2A which includes "Five Saints Square" and Sackville Green, South Regent Park. These drawings are expected to be presented to the next Regent Park Technical Steering Committee meeting. Landscaping in Saints Square will not be done until next spring.

#### HIGHLIGHTS OF R.P.C.I.A. PROPOSAL TO O.H.C.

At the May 22nd meeting of the Tenant Association Mr. Barry Rose, Property Manager of OHC presented a proposal to the Association concerning Tenant Participation in Management. Mr. Rose proposed that OHC is willing to enter into a contract with the RPCIA for a number of services - unit reps, laundry room attendants, ground keepers, part time elevator operators, etc.

A committee of seventeen tenants was elected to look into this proposal and to report back to the Tenants Association. The committee met over the summer months and has prepared a proposal to the September 18th. meeting. The proposal with two amendments was adopted unanimously by the meeting and will be presented to OHC within the next two weeks.

The highlights of this proposal are:

- 45 UNIT REPS FOR 32 BUILDINGS AND HOUSES 10 FOR HIGH RISE BUILDINGS IN SOUTH REGENT 8 FOR FOUR 6 STOREY BUILDINGS AND 23 FOR 3 STOREY BUILDINGS IN NORTH REGENT

UNIT REPS WILL BE AVAILABLE TO TENANTS AT LEAST THREE HOURS DAILY.

IT IS PROPOSED THAT UNIT REPS BE PAID \$2.50 PER HOUR.

THERE WILL BE A THREE MONTH MANDATORY TRAINING PERIOD CONSITING OF LECTURES ON HUMAN RELATIONS ADMINISTRATION, AVAILABLE SERVICES, MANAGEMENT, ETC.

- A TENANT MANAGEMENT BOARD TO DEAL WITH RENT ARREARS, EVICTIONS, LEASE TERMINATIONS AND OTHER GRIEVANCES. THE BOARD WILL CONSIST OF TEN TENANTS (5 SOUTH, 5 NORTH) AS WELL AS REPRESENTATIVES FROM OHC MANAGEMENT. THE BOARD WILL MEET AS OFTEN AS NECESSARY.
- TWO TENANTS TO BE EMPLOYED IN NORTH REGENT AND SOUTH REGENT OHC OFFICES. THESE PEOPLE WILL WORK AND CO-OPERATE WITH OHC STAFF. IN CASES WHERE A SATISFACTORY SOLUTION CANNOT BE ACHIEVED THE TENANT WILL BE REFERRED TO THE TENANT MANAGEMENT BOARD.

Tenants serving on the Board to be paid comparable rates as other OHC employees. The proposed budget is \$122,850.00 annually for Unit Reps; rates for members of Tenant Management Board and tenant office employees to be decided. There will be a 10% Management fee

## A SUCCESSFUL PROGRAM FOR TEENS AND SENIOR CITIZENS

COMMUNITY INTERAGE PROJECT - an Opportunities for Youth project, operating out of the OAK COMMUNITY SCHOOL site this last summer, was conceived in the main instance to offer programmes to a group of citizens perceived to be of .mes neglected or inadequately served by other agencies or institutions - Senior Citizens. We hoped morover, not only to involve and Citizens in distinct activities designed specifically for them, but also to encourage their interaction and communication with younger members of the community including oursel-

After some trial and error, weekly programs were started including, picnics, movies, trips, bingos, etc. Although we found that twelve weeks was not long enough to implement interage programmes, we had excellent response to the activities we planned for younger and older people. We feel we established core groups of interested people from both age groups which a successful interage program could be established. The Oak Citizens Committee is now in the process of seeking funding for a project which includes continuing the work which we were able to accomplish. We laid a foundation which they wish to build upon. We feel they deserve the community's support.



# 7 NEWS to canvass ward Seven door to door to raise \$14.000

For the first time in the history of Ward Seven, a community organization based within the Ward will conduct a ward-wide door to door canvass to raise funds.

The Board of Directors of Seven News, Inc. made a decision to conduct a canvass early in August after a number of meetings with community leaders and after evaluating the results of a questionnaire on the subject printed in SEVEN

The RPCIA has been approached for its help with the Fund drive. At the September 11th Council meeting of the RPCIA the proposal to canvass in Regent Park was supported upon two conditions. It was stressed that full approval could only be obtained from the General membership and that if approved the canvass must work closely with the Lottery Committee to lessen any conflict with the RPCIA fund raising campaign. Area captains for Regent Park will be Minnie Nicholson for South, and Betty Strand for the North. Canvassers are now being sought for the ten day drive - September 22 - October 1st. Anyone interested should please contact the area captains or Jeff Gottschalk, Campaign Co-ordinator at 920-8633 for further information.

The support of the entire Ward is needed if the drive will be successful, and it is hoped that our Ward paper can be expanded and still continue to be distributed free to area residents.

The target figure for the SEVEN NEWS Fund Raising Campaign is \$19,000.of which \$14,000 will be raised through door-to-door canvassing with in the ward. All funds raised, over and above campaign expenses will be used to pay staff salaries and any losses the paper might incur during the year of publication starting with September.




