REGENT PARK HOME-HELP

Elderly and handicapped residents of Regent Park will soon be able to get homemaker service right in their own apartments. The purpose of this program is to keep people in their own apartments and out of nursing homes.

Regent Park's Senior Citizens Busy Bee Club is responsible for coming up with this idea to help Senior Citizens. They knew from experience that many senior citizens are helping other seniors who are unable to shop, clean, or get out of their apartments. At times these helpers get requests which they can not do and no one is available to do them. Also there are not enough people to take care of all the others who need help.

This experience led them into contacting Metro Social Services about establishing a homemaker service in Regent Park. The Busy Bee Club was told that Metro Social Services does have an arrangement where they pay approved agencies on an hourly rate for homemaker services. Since 'an incorporated group had to make application to Metro, the Busy Bee Club appro- Jody Phillips Awards being given to the ached the RPCIA.

A proposal was sent to Metro and favourably received. Only one proworker doing the work, but not for anyone to run the program, or telephone and office expenses. Without money for these expenses the program would never start.



The Regent Park Community Improvement Association is pleased to announce that ten students of five local schools received awards in this second year of the Jody Phillips Awards.

The RPCIA established these awards to commemorate the memory of the nine year old boy from Regent Park - Jody Phillips who was killed in 1969. Jody was crossing the railway tracks on his way to swimming when this tragic accident occurred. Other children from this community have been killed in similar circumstances over the years.

The people of Regent Park in reaction to Jody's death went on a march and raised close to \$3,000., for a swimming pool so that such tragedies would never again occur. Since then a swimming pool has been built in Regent Park, through the co-operation of three levels of government. Therefore the Association decided to use the money for scholarships.

This year the awards were given to Roland Ho and Cheryl Balogh from Lord Dufferin, Marlene Morita and Lee Swaffield from Park School, Michael Wong and Lucy Troisi from Regent Park School, Sandra Speedie and Anil Chopra of Sprucecourt School, and Elizabeth Healey and Paul Hogan of St. Paul's School.



However, any senior citizen or handicapped tenant who needs a homemaker should let the Busy Bee Club, Health Centre, or Services Unit know about it. Anyone who applies for the service will be visited by a worker from the Social Services Department to see if they are eligible. This is necessary because Metro will only pay for those people who are eligible. If the program is successful many more people will be able to stay in their own apartments, take care of themselves, and have someone available to help with those thing
