ELECTION SEPT.15

The Regent Park Community Improvement Association this summer voted to clear itself of any possible conflicts of interest among its Board Members. A potentially conflicting situation was created when an increasing member Board members had salaried positions within the Association.

This is a direct result of the increase in the Tenant Management Program. Three years ago the Association had no such program, and there was one paid RPCIA employee. Two years ago there were 26 full and part-time employees. This year there are 70 full and part-time employees. Several of the people who had worked as volunteers on committees and the Executive applied for and received jobs under this program creating a situation where they were both employer and employee. The Board of Directors is the official employer of all RPCIA employees, but many of the directors were also paid Association employees.

July, 1976 the Executive Committee resigned to clear up the situation. Janet Ross, former President, is now Assistant Manager.

Ozzie Smith, Ex First-Vice-President, Marie Niven, ex Second Vice-President, and Monica

Sullivan, ex Secretary, all resigned to keep their positions as Unit Representatives. Barbara Soules, former Treasurer, resigned to take a position as Resident Visitor. Each of them regretted having to leave the positions they were elected to in 1975, but they felt that it would be better for the Association if no one could be accused of making decisions for their own benefit.

The rest of the Board remains in Office until the Special Election which will take place Wednesday, September 15. At that time a new

Executive will be elected and new Directors to fill the vacancies created by the resignation of those who are paid staff of the Association.

Remaining as RPCIA Directors are: Arthur Scullion, Bob Woodgate, Iris Jackman, Maria Hellaman, all of South Regent. From North Regent only Bill Deeley remains. Resigning because they were in a conflict-of-interest position are: Clara Little, Ulric Callender, Marg Varey. Although not in a conflict-of interest situation Arthur Farrell and Linda Taylor resign for personal reasons.

KITSON'S EGERTON

Gary Egerton and Irene Kitson emerged as contenders for the Presidency of the RPCIA at a nomination meeting held at St. Cyril's, Wednesday September 1, 1976. The position has been held by Janet Ross since her unopposed election in early 1974.

The Election was set for Wednesday September 15 to fill vacancies in the Executive and North and South Regent Board members caused by resignations which the Board itself insisted upon to clear up potential conflicts of interest.

The biggest contest will be for the position of President. Irene Kitson and Gary Egerton have both filed nomination papers. Mrs. Kitson is currently a Unit Rep but plans to resign that position if elected. She has been active in the Association since its beginning working on various committees including the Service Unit. 


One of the highlights will be a floor hockey match between the Regent Park Camp and the NDP Challengers.





Regent Park have taken the lead in this respect. The people of Regent Park through the R.P.C.I.A. have brought some changes to the face of the area.
