HOUSES FOR LOW INCOME FAMILIES.

Want to buy a house even though your family income is under \$16,000? You might be interested in a small development that's now being constructed on Berkeley and Poulette Street, south of Dundas.

Quetico Homes is now building 16 three-story row houses. Eight on Berkeley and Eight on Poulette. The original plan was that all 16 houses would be sold under the Assisted Home Ownership Plan--that's the federal government scheme where, if the house sells for less that \$47,000, the government will provide financial help, depending on income, for up to five years. Under the programme, a family with an income as low as \$10,000, can afford to purchase an AHOP home.

However, Quetico Homes ran into cost problems, and the present plan is that only eight of the 16 units will be sold under the AHOP plan. Since this change will require the consent of City Hall's Committee of Adjustment, it has been possible to get the developer to agree to give priority, until October 23, to families with incomes of under \$16,000.

Usually, when houses for \$47,000 are put on the market, those houses are smapped up by couples and families with incomes of \$20,000 or more. Those with higher incomes don't get any of the AHOP subsidies available, but inexensive houses aren't easy to find. People with incomes under \$16,000—and they are the families for whom the AHOP programme was designed—don't seem to be able to get their foor in the door.

But in this case, subject to Committee of Adjustment approval, we think that we've arranged a headstart for families with gross income of under \$16,000. Purchases are subject to approval by CMHC, of course.

Interested, then call Quetico Homes, at 789–7613 soon, certainly before October 23rd. If you're worried about what to do, or if you want the name af a lawyer you might consult, call either myself

We hope that families with incomes of less than \$16,000 will take advantage of this arrangement. If people think it's useful, we'll try and get other developers to agree

GEOGRAPHY

Political geography investigates questions of how political systems impose themselves on the Earth. Why is the Earth divided into political units each having more or less permanent population?

We should never forget that as humans - children of the Most Mightiful Creator we are all geographers, each and every one of us.

WHAT IS A PLAN?

- 1) A Plan is directed towards rational action.
- 2) It is a future time-orientation. That is to say, a plan is a series of statements formulated in the present for future execution.
- A plan is a statement about conscious changes in the state of a person's behaviour and feeling.
- A plan is a set of statements that are to promote the achievement of certain goals.
- 5) A plan sets forth what must be done.
- 6) A plan exists only in the mind or in written or spoken form.
- 7) Every plan has one general goal; it also has specific goal, that is, those goals that the plan intend to carry out.

It is crucial to note that: "Almost any action can result from planning, and almost any goal can be planned for. In formulating a plan, one must always remember to ask how many will it help, and how much?"

A NEWSPAPER'S FUNCTIONS.

THE EDITOR

The first and most important consideration of a newspaper, it should be remembered, is that it is a medium of communication. A good newspaper will report important events occuring at home and abroad. It is a newspaper's job to report accurately and objectively. Think for a moment about your own "reporting". When you get into trouble at school do you tell your parents-ojectively—what happened? Or do you give just your side of the story? A newspaper should not report only one side of the story: it should give the whole story.

A good newspaper will also attempt to explain why an event happened and what its effects will be. In other words it will interpret the news. It will not report only the fact that Russia and communist China are in disagreement over the role of Communism in the world, but it will give the softening of Russia's relations with the West and one of the reasons for the disagreement. A good newspaper will also point out the possible consequences of such a disagreement in addition, a good newspaper should be an influence for social improvement both locally and world wide.

A good newspaper will also be a cleaning house: a medium for bringing together the consumer and goods for sale the job seeker and jobs vacant, the playgoers and the play. As such, a newspaper performs a vital funcation in the community. Finally, a good newspaper is itself entertaining. It is so because it helps to satisfy people's curiosity about the world around them.

Another important function of a newspaper is the campaign for local projects. Serving Regent Park's resident is the main reson for the existance of the Regent Park Community News. The newspaper can be of far more benefit to its readers are also willing to share its veiws, etc., with others through the newspaper. If you have tried everything, and all has failed, humble yourself before your Creator and maker, and he will show you a way. Thank You.


