

Dear MRG Member or interested physician;

An important general membership meeting of the Medical Reform Group has been planned for Sunday, October 14, in Toronto; we hope you will be able to attend.

Over the summer, MRG chapters in Toronto and Hamilton have been meeting to draft a constitution and to develop a preliminary position on the issues of opting out and other threats to medical care, and cutbacks in government spending. The draft constitution is enclosed with this mailing.

On October 14, we will be meeting to formally constitute the group, to elect a steering committee, to adopt a position on opting out and cutbacks, and to chart the future directions and priorities of the MRG. We plan to issue our first press release following this meeting.

We have chosen October 14 as the date for the meeting to coincide

We have chosen October 14 as the date for the meeting to coincide with two other important events (both, unfortunately, scheduled for October 13)- the Canadian Medical Group of Amnesty International's seminar called "Doctors Confront Torture" and a conference on medicare sponsored by the Ontario Federation of Labour and entitled "Medicare in Crisis". Details of these two events later in this mailing.

In order that we can prepare adequately for the general meeting, we would greatly appreciate your filling out the enclosed orange form indicating whether or not you plan to attend. Even if you cannot come, lease return the form: it is crucial for us to define our membership and to get a sense of the MRG's support country-wide.

MRG UPDATE: What's Been Happening.

A brief history of the MRG, especially for new members and those outside Toronto and Hamilton ...

The Medical Reform Group was formed in the fall of 1978 by a handful of Toronto doctors: it grew by word of mouth to about 25 members. mostly from Toronto. During the winter, a mailing announcing the existence of the organization was sent to all physicians in Toronto. This mailing, and an ad in the CMAJ boosted our mailing list to about 100 physicians and medical students across the country.

In May 1979 we held our first general meeting. Of the 60 docotrs who attended, over fifty decided to join the organization, and the meeting identified two immediate needs for the group: the need to develop an organizational structure and the need to develor a public position on the related issues of cutbacks and opting out. Over the summer, MRG members in Toronto and Hamilton have been meeting to achieve these objectives.

An MRG chapter in Hamilton, consisting of over forty members, has been meeting regularly since June of this year. They have published a newsletter which has been widely distributed to Hamilton area physicians, and will be holding an open public meeting on September 19 in an attempt to attract more members. A group of MRG members has been meeting regularly in Halifax, and there are numbers of members in Vancouver.

Calgary and Saskatoon.

Our mailing list now includes over 150 physicians across Canada; the majority of these are members. After the group has been formally constituted in October we will be revising the mailing list and working to increase the membership, so that there is a strong, progressive voice for Canadian doctors.

The Medical Reform Group is a decentralized organization with most of its activities and decisions taking place at the regional level. Wembership is based solely on agreement with the principles of the Group, as elaborated in the Constitution.

THE CONSTITUTION:

A final draft of the Constitution of the Medical Reform Group has been prepared and is enclosed with this mailing. Because the Constitution will define the group - its principles and operation - we urge you to read it carefully in advance of the general meeting, and to bring your comments, amendments (and copy of the Constitution!) to the general meeting. The Constitution has changed somewhat since the first draft. To

summarize its features it:

- defines the principles of the Group, elaborating on those

adopted at the May general meeting - creates three categories of membership:

full - Ontario doctors and medical students affiliate - out of province doctors and medical students associate - non-physicians

- creates a provincial organization in which the regional chapters carry the bulk of the decision-making authority

and form the basic functional unit

- provides for a provincial steering committee to coordinate the activities of the group around the province and edit a newsletter.

We hope that MRG members in other provinces will constitute themselves into provincial organizations similar to that in Ontario, with a view to establishing a national organization as soon as possible. A more detailed discussion of this proposal is being sent to MRG members outside Ontario.

WORKING GROUPS: OPTING OUT & CUTBACKS

A working committee of
Toronto and Hamilton area members
has been meeting over the summer
compiling research towards an MRG
position on the issues of opting
out and cutbacks. This will be
presented and discussed at the
October 14 meeting. In addition
they have been compiling anecdotal information from MRG members
documenting problems faced by their

patients or themselves, resulting from a scarcity of opted-in physicians or from cutbacks in health spending. Your contributions are welcome.

A working group on occupational health has been formed in Hamilton. Other working groups will be formed as the interest and energy arises; bring your ideas to the general meeting.

CANADIAN MEDICAL GROUP SEMINAR

Doctors Confront Torture is the title of a seminar to be held Saturday October 13, from 9:00 until 15:30 at the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education, 252 Bloor Street West, Toronto, under the auspices of the Canadian Medical Group of Amnesty International.

The Canadian Medical Group has examined over 130 victims of political torture, mainly from Latin America, has published several papers on torture, and has participated in international conferences and antitorture campaigns. The seminar on October 13 has been organized with two objectives in mind:

- -to inform health care professionals and their associates about national and international work against torture
- -to organize further specialty and regional medical groups for anti-torture work in Canada

Papers and presentations will be given covering torture and the refugee, legal aspects of the refugee process, physical sequelae of torture, psychiatric aspects of torture, and dental aspects of torture. A Danish researcher will discuss current progress in international nti-torture research. The afternoon will be devoted to small group asscussions of current activities, needs, and priorities of the Canadian Medical Group.

Registration fee is four dollars (\$4.00) payable to the Canadian Medical Group, Toronto.

MEDICARE IN CRISIS: A CONFERENCE


ACCOMMODATION
