Dear Ray a Duna yevskaya,

Please forgive my long delay in replying. I get completely overwhelmed with my letters and tend to do all the routine ones first.

I had intended to enclose something I've written which originated as a talk about some implications I believe have been ignored by the left in Britain, which partly arise from the women's movement, partly from the longer efforts to work out ways of organising which avoid the ~~same~~ tendency to centralisation within democratic centralism. But it has to be duplicated. I'll send it you when it's done. It's also got an account of the personal effect changes in I.S./S.W.P. had on me. I think the question of organisation has always had a great atmosphere of authority around it for me which I find very disturbing. I think probably the group e. S.W.P. have contributed to that - as if the answers were already known and deviation from them meant you fell down some terrible abyss. This makes it impossible for people to trust their own experience - in fact it encourages people to deny it. Annoyingly in saying this they always accuse you of being dismissive of theory - by which they mean what they think.

I was very interested in what you said about Tony Cliff. I don't really know his theory I know Harry and his daughter Hannah. Many close friends of mine were in I.S.W.P. but most have left - or they've changed. I feel uncanny echoes of the C.P. It's felt as if from 1970s they were living on the late 20s early 30s and was set into the mid 30s. The anti-Nazi hege- mon has had a big national impact & got good publicity & footfalls & T.V. personalities support it. But the actual relationship of I.S.W.P. to people who are non-members remains unworked out & there is a lot of arrogance and self-righteousness around the membership attitude. The positive aspect is their great strength

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in activity and going onwards to working class people.
But there is trouble too because the real problems
of a middle class group change. The class basis have
not been deeply examined. Their division of theory has
become a division of reality. One new area
I. Hily has been class section in relation to the
left of the women movement but has got a
different emergence which is distinctive of local
activity and everyday experience.

We have at the start of the programme a discussion

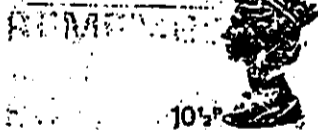

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Rough transcript of Rowbotham letter

11/23/78

Please forgive my long delay in replying. I got completely overwhelmed with my letters and tend to do all the routine ones first.

I think the question of organization has always had a great atmosphere of authority around it for me, which I find very daunting. I think the Trotskyist groups & SWP here have contributed to that-- as if the answers were already known and deviation from them meant you fell down some terrible abyss. This makes it impossible for people to trust their own experience-- in fact it encourages people to deny it. Annoyingly in saying this they always accuse you of being dismissive of theory-- by which they mean what they think.

I was very interested in what you said about Tony Cliff (I think he perhaps finds it hard to relate to women as people with theory). I really don't know him though I know Honey and his daughter Ilana. Many close friends of mine were in IS/SWP but most have left-- or they've changed. I feel (uncanny) echoes of the CP. It's felt as if from 1974-75 they were living over the late 20s, early 30s, and now are into the mid-30s. The Anti-Nazi league has had a big national impact and got good publicity and footballers and TV personalities support it. (But) the actual relationship of ~~the~~ SWP to people who are non-members remains unworked out and there is a lot of arrogance and self-righteousness around the membership's attitude. The positive aspect is their great stress on activity and going outwards towards working class people. But there is trouble too because the real problems of a middle class group changing its class basis have not been deeply examined. Their dismissal of theory has become a dismissal of thinking over new areas.
