Dear Dave:

Please enswer at once the favor I will ask of you (and send to my home, not to the office which delays it) regarding the contents of Vol. 20 of PL's Collecte: Works. (I enclose Peter's letter to me on that; please return that to me.)

The reason for the needed speed is that I'm preparing Chapter 2 for printing in the next issue of N&L; WMANN my deadline is right now. I want to mention your papphlet as if it is already published. Here is the way footnote 2 (which appears on my page 1) reads: "This 1906 papphlet, Massenstreik, Partel und Geverkschaften is included in Cosummelte Wrks, Vol. 2 (Perlin: Dietz Verlag, 1972, 1974), pp. 91-170. The pumphlet was first translated into English by Patrick Lavin (Detroit: Marrist Educational Society, 1925). For those passages which were quoted by Rosa Luxemburg in her 1910 article, "Theory and Practice," I have used the translation of David Wolff.

Now this may appear like a simple footnote. It isn't. The shocker has just become clear to me this very minute. That is to say, whenever I meation Collected Worker I had taken for granted that those were available to Nettle.

I couldn't ever figure out why, in his very elaborate bibliography, pp. 363-917, he puts Gesammelte Wake way at the end, since one of the references that I made in this very footnote I just quoted to you listed Val. 2 as the one that includes the Mass Strike pasphlet, whereas he listed Vol. IV. I went to recheck his references. And it was only then that I found out that the GW he quotes were only intended to be that by Zetkin and Warsky and whereas they gave out a list of 9 volumes they were going to publish, only three —III, IV and VI — were published. In a word, the poor ram had started his bibliography so "peculiarly" with Letters, published and unpublished; then with Speeches; then Articles; and only at the very cad "Books" when they weren't enything but pamphlets — because, believe it or not, outside of Accumulation of Capital (AND THAT ONLY IN GEMAN), there were no books published, and this was as late as 1965! (No wonder when I wrote my critique of Acc. of Capital in the carly 1940s I did 1t from the Russian!) In a word, even if I seem to be repeating myself ad nauseam, the damm Stalinists didn't start publishing until after Nettl's biography appeared in 1966 and created such a stir as well as the fact that the 1968 near-revolutions had occurred, that in 1972 we first got the Collected Works. And are they really Collected?

Here is where you come in. I want the Contents page of YATXAXETXENY Vol. 5 of GW. Peter, who had done the contents of all 4 volumes, you will see from the emclosed note, didn't bother with Vol. 5 sinceobviously it contained what I already had, Acc. of Capital, etc. -- and in fact I also have what he wasn't sure of, and that is Rh's review of Vol. 2 & 3 of Capital which she had written for Mehring's biography of Harx; and of course we also have RLs letters to Jogiches. What I must have is the Title of each book or pamphlet or article in that Vol. 5 and then the page numbers where it appears.

I swear I can't get over it. To think that RL's works, which limin asked be published at once, and at once meant the very day she was murdered, were never published in full and at best were published only when a polemic arose, which in Stalin's day meant all the time, and even before them meant only acc. of Capital, because the German Communist Party, i.e. Luxemburg, bad come to the Congress with

instructions from her, before she died, that the 3rd International should not yet be formed.
