Local folk spurned

The Ontario Housing Corporation has flatly turned down a request by the South of Carlton Working Committee to give local residents first choice as tenants for the new O.H.C. building at Sherbourne and Shuter streets.

In a letter dated May 24, 1973, Mr. Riggs, Acting Managing Director for O.H.C., said: ". . we would first of all want to hear from Metro and if they believe we should change our policy, then we would like to contact other groups, including persons on the waiting list regarding their views.

At a recent meeting of South of Carlton Community Action, Vera Ellsworth claimed that some people in the area are afraid to apply for low-rent O.H.C. accomodation for fear they'll be forced to move out of their neighbourhood.

At its last meeting, the Working Committee passed a motion asking O.H.C. to open a local rental office for another development at Dundas and Sherbourne.

Two other areas have already won an agreement from O.H.C. on this issue. Local residents will have first choice of the O.H.C. housing units both in Trefann Court and in the Wigwamen Project.

Our paper begins its 4th year

With this issue, SEVEN NEWS goes into its fourth year of publication and maintains its place as the oldest community-run newspaper in Toronto.

The paper is almost as old as Ward 7. The ward was created late in 1969 just before the municipal election; the paper began six months later, on May 29, 1970.

SEVEN NEWS is truly a community newspaper, a non-profit organization owned and operated by the residents of the ward. The columns of the paper are open to anyone who lives, works or worships in the ward.

SEVEN NEWS has largely done away with the role of the reporter. Every member of the ward is a "reporter" on his or her own experience. In this way, SEVEN NEWS has become an alternate kind of journalism to the thirdperson journalism of the commercial media.

Community involvement in the paper has grown steadily during the past three years. At present about 200 unpaid volunteers are involved in each issue, including writers and distributors who range from 8-yearold kids to university professors and who deliver 23,000 copies to almost every doorstep.

Where do we go from here? The debate is just beginning: Should we charge, say, 10c a copy? Should we go after grants? How much can we increase our advertising revenue? Although people tell us we are widely read and appreciated, how many people are really reading the paper?

These are some of the questions that must be answered. Perhaps a start will be made at the next editorial meeting on Sunday, June 17, at 7:30 p.m. at the Don Vale Community Centre, 80 Winchester St. All SEVEN NEWS meetings are open, and Ward 7 residents are encouraged to attend and take part in making decisions and helping to improve our paper.

MONEY GOES

An Ontario Housing Corporation supervisor has been suspended after metro police were called in last week to investigate an alleged theft of O.H.C. goods. Two members of the Canadian Union of Public Employees told their union president, Don Roach, that they had been ordered by an O.H.C. supervisor to deliver two doors, 40 pounds of ceiling tiles and a quantity of lumber to the private garage of the supervisor's home.

C.U.P.E. members working for O.H.C. say there is widespread disappearance of goods from O.H.C. stockrooms, including new refrigerators and stoves.

Charges that O.H.C. mismanagement is resulting in high rents and a waste of taxpayers' money have been noted recently by a number of tenant groups.

City to impose 45 ft. height limit in south of Carlton area

Charles Anthony, who owns the parking lot across the street from the Westover Hotel and manages the land south of Dundas between Pembroke and Sherbourne for Meridian, came before the May 28 meeting of the South of Carlton Working Committee.

The City intends to impose a height limitation of 45 feet on this part of the South of Carlton area next month so any developer who wants to build higher than 4 or 5 storeys now has to discuss his plans with the community.

As a result, Mr. Anthony came to the last Working Committee meeting to ask the Committee whether they had any suggestions for development on the property.

Mr. Anthony's main interest is to sell the land to a developer. People agreed that it was too early to come to any concrete conclusions on what should be built on the land so it will be discussed further at the next

BRAIDA BLOCK

More news on the development for the vacant lot on the Dundas-Sherbourne corner. Mr. Braida originally applied to build a ninestorey roomer's hostel on the site but since City Council passed a ban on apartment hotels, he may not be able to put his plan into effect.

As a result, a group of people from the Working Committee with architects Diamond and Myers, have been talking with Mr. Braida

about how the plans for the building might be changed to fit in better with the neighborhood.

Some of the goals the Committee would like to see as part of the project are: a mix of people rather than all roomers; make the building lower than nine storeys; have some stores, possibly a mall through the building; and keep 237 and 239 Sherbourne Street. It is hoped that an agreement will be reached soon.

Information centre to deal with birth control and pre-natal care

The Family Information Centre, working out of Don Vale Community Centre, (80 Winchester St.) is an O.F.Y. sponsored project concerned with the lack of information available about birth control, pre-natal and post-natal care, and similar health problems related to the family unit.

They are open from 10 am to 8 pm, 5 days a week to dispense literature and make referrals. They will assist in making appointments with doctors, and provide accompaniment to clinics. Each staff member is versed in the field, and able to counsel, explain and demonstrate birth control methods.

A doctor will be present on Monday afternoons from 1:30 to 4:30 each week to examine and write prescriptions for birth control devices

The Family Information Centre will also be hosting youth workshops and open community forums at Don Vale Community Centre with guest speakers and films.

Babysitting will be provided for children whose parents attend forums, as well as for mothers who are otherwise unable to attend clinic appointments.



Legal aid clinics continue in Ward 7

Unknown to many residents of Ward 7 despite the hundreds of cases they have handled over the past two years in this part of town, are the five legal assistance clinics run by the Student Legal Aid Society (SLAS), an organization of law students at the University of Toronto.

SLAS has been in operation for five years and over the past two years it has expanded its activities outward from its campus centre at 44 St. George St.

Completely staffed by students, all of the services provided by SLAS are free. However, all the difficult cases, as well as all the cases going to court, are checked by a lawyer hired for that purpose by SLAS,

SLAS is not sure to what extent it is allowed to go to court for its clients, but it does make a regular practice of acting for clients in Small Claims Court, and Magistrates' Court for Highway Traffic and summary conviction offences

They also appear for people in front of the Immigration Appeal Board, the Unemployment Review Board, and other administrative tribunals.

They give advice and assistance

on almost every legal problem a Ward 7 resident may encounter from welfare to divorce, from a parking ticket to a notice of eviction, and many others. Also, everything that you tell them is completely confidential.

Over the summer, the program is funded by Opportunities For Youth and employs 12 students to run the campus clinic and 14 others. Of these 14, five are in Ward 7 at the following places:

Open Door Center, All Saints Church, 315 Dundas St. E., Tues, Thurs, 1-2:30 p.m.

Friendship Center, All Saints Church, 315 Dundas St. E., Tues, Thurs 2:30-4 p.m.; Wed 7-9 p.m.

Neighbourhood Information Post, 265 Gerrard St. E., (924-2544), Wed. 1-4; 7:30 - 10 p.m.

Dixon Hall, 58 Sumach St. (863-0499), Mon-Thurs 11 a.m. — 3 p.m.

Bain Avenue, 100 Bain Ave., 5 the Oaks (a private apartment), Mon 7:30 - 10 p.m.

There are also other places in Ward 7 where free legal assistance can be obtained. The Eastminster Church, on Danforth, has hired two law students for the summer and they are there all day. Lawyers are available at Dixon Hall On Monday from 7 to 9 p.m., where they are backed up by a volunteer student as well, and at the Donvale Community Centre on Tuesday from 6 to 7:30.

Also, the Campus Legal Assistance Center, the SLAS' central clinic at the University of Toronto, is open Monday to Friday 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. at 44 St. George St.

It's all over says LIP man

A federal government bureaucrat has told SEVEN NEWS that all Local Initiative Program grants are to be phased out by the end of summer.

Projects employing five or less will end on June 30; projects employing six to 10 will end on July 31; and projects employing 11 to 20 will end on August 31. Projects apparently will be cancelled according to this formula, regardless of merit.

Projects of native peoples will be phased out in November.






