

New Housing Co-op seeks CMHC funding

The Don District Co-op Housing Corporation is moving ahead fast on all fronts in the hope of being able to buy their first house within four months.

- A ten-man Board of Directors has been selected and formal provincial incorporation is underway.
- A tentative budget of \$7,050 has been set to cover the corporation's first six month's of operation and a grant request is being made for that

• A sub-committee is working full out to draw up a formal application for the project to be submitted to Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation for their approval.

Board Members

The Board of Directors for the Corporation, all of whom live and-or work in the Don District are: Dennis Wood, Keith Loffler, Hugh Taggart, Marion Service, Pat Travis, Pat Walker, Michael Stuart, Frank Mills, Mary Balogh and Bill Strothers.

It was pointed out at their last meeting that CMHC will judge their applications on the competence of the Board of Directors, the pool of expertise available to the organization and a serious intent on the part of the group and the community.

Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation will make a grant of up to \$10,000 to any non-profit housing group. The budget drawn up by the Don Area group is for \$7,000 for six months. This covers legal costs, the hiring of a co-ordinator, bookkeeping expenses, the rental of a storefront office, research and community development costs.

The purpose of the organization will be to provide livable, quality accomodation for the maximum allowable number of people at the minumal possible cost. This will be accomplished by buying up houses in the Don District, rehabilitating or re-structuring them and renting them out to low income people.

Funding for the buying of the houses will come from CMHC who will provide 100 per cent of the value of the house at 75% per cent interest. CMHC will also provide an outright grant of 10 per cent of the house cost for rehabilitation or a \$4,000 loan per unit of which \$2,000 is forgivable. The group can also make use of grants and low income loans available through the City of Toronto and the Ontario Housing Corporation.

Four Groups

The establishment of the Don District Co-op Housing Corporation will make four non-profit and-or co-op housing groups in Ward Seven and three in the Don District. Other groups are Neighbourhood Renewal in the Woodgreen area, Don West Neighbours Group in the South of Carlton area, and Co-op Habitat in Trefann.

The South Cabbagetown Community Improvement Association are also in the process of setting up a non-profit, co-op housing corporation but efforts are being made to join that group with the Don District corporation.

The Don District housing group is still in need of experts or knowledgeable people in the fields of architecture, construction, maintenance and accounting. Public, open meetings are held at the Community Secretariat office at 249 Gerrard East. Contact Michael Stuart at 923-9869 for

Block meetings in SOCCA area achieve results

Block meetings have been held throughout the South of Carlton area in the past month and they have achieved considerable success in dealing with some of the issues and problems raised.

Residents on Berkeley street, between Dundas and Gerrard sent a letter to the Toronto Streets Department asking that litter baskets be set up throughout the area as litter on the block was a concern to residents.

The Streets Department moved quickly on the problem and additional litter baskets have been placed throughout the area.

On lower Berkeley street, residents were bothered for a long time by a garage that they thought was a nuisance. Calls were made to the owner and the city to get the place cleaned up. In the middle of June, the owner moved his garage from the block — apparently because of all the complaints.

On Seaton street, residents have been trying to find out about a garage that planned for Gerrard and Seaton. Many residents feel a garage isn't needed there and would cause a lot of noise, traffic and nuisance on the street. Buildings on the site are being demolished but so

far, residents have been unsuccessful in efforts to talk to the builder or view the plans for the building. However, they're still

On lower Seaton street, block meetings discussed the problems of local skid row men being turned out of their beds so early in the morning. People felt that older men especially should be permitted to stay at least until 9 or 10 a.m. and ideally use their room for the day as a more permanent home.

It was felt that the present arrangement of being put out on the street at 6:30 or 7 a.m. was

dehumanizing.

Some residents on lower Seaton also got together to write a letter to Barony Estates about the cement trucks blocking laneways and using Seaton street all day. This construction traffic has made the quiet tree-lined residential street into a busy thoroughfare for droning, polluting, heavy cement trucks and other construction equipment.

In reply, the contractors stated that their eventual hope is to funnel this traffic onto Shuter street where it will be less of a nuisance to local residents.

There appears to be a great deal of concern, confusion and misunderstanding about proposals recently brought before the Toronto Board of Education by groups of Greek parents at both Jackman and Frankland schools.

On May 3, 1973, the Toronto Board made what may come to be known as an historic decision. It recommended "that the teaching of languages, other than English and French, and cultural subjects related to these be included as options in the Toronto Boards' public elementary school program where there is sufficient demand for such a program."

This recommendation was passed with the following, important conditions: 1) provided that

Federal funding can be obtained for any additional costs for staff; 2) that permission is granted by the Ontario Ministry of Education for such programs, and 3) that these classes be open to all children who wish to participate.

On July 16, 1973, groups of Greek parents from both Frankland and Jackman Public Schools in Ward Seven appeared before the Educating New Canadians Committee of the Board and presented identical proposals for Greco-Canadian Bicultural and Bilingual Immersion Programs in their respective schools.

Highlights of the Greek parents proposal were:

- The school principal be in charge of the total program.
- · A bicultural, bi-lingual teacher will supervise the classes and co-

At the July 16, meeting, the trustees added the following: the programs are to be offered during the period between 9 a.m. -4 p.m. on regular school days and the development of detailed procedures are to be worked out to the satisfaction of the total staff-parent community (not simply the Greek parents).

These two conditions are most significant. The first provides options in offering the programs during the lunch period or during the 3:15-4:00 p.m. period in addition to during regular class times. The second means that the specific details have to be worked out to the satisfaction of a majority of all the parents of the school. If this cannot be done, the matter is to be brought back before the Educating New Canadians Committee.

These two amendments seem to be accepted by Mr. Brian Hay, cochairman of the recently formed community and school association of Jackman avenue public school. Mr. Hay presented a brief at the July 16 meeting expressing concern over the fact that the wider community seem to have been ignored in the planning of the proposal. Hopefully appropriate compromises can be worked out by all concerned when the detailed plans are brought to a public

In conclusion, let us make a few points very clear. The above proposals are completely subject to the Ontario Ministery of Education. If the Ministery approves them, they can be implimented (provided the community is satisfied). If it does not they will not go ahead. At any rate, the worst the province can approve is a course in Greek culture and not Greek language. It is not legally possible to conduct classes in any other languages than French or English in Ontario elementary schools.

The Ministry as well as the local community may have strong opinions as to the specific times each day that these classes will be held. There is nothing in these two proposals about either a teachersupervised lunchroom or report cards in languages other than English. Where these rumors began, we are not sure.

Local youths form ball-hockey league

We can always hear about our teenagers getting into trouble, or how irresponsible they are, so it's like a breath of fresh air, for the parents of teens in particular, to hear of something constructive done by our "juveniles"

This involves a group of boys, all sports-minded, who at school's year end foresaw a long and uneventful summer; Jim Plytas - 15, working part-time and playing baseball for Alderwood; Nino Gaspari - 15, playing hardball for Leaside, lacrosse goal for Beaches, and hockey for Weston; Brian Moffat -15; all students of Riverdale Collegiate.

At the end of April the boys decided to set up a ball-hockey team and Simpson Avenue United Church was kind enough to donate their gym for practises. The Church then donated their basement when the group, realizing that they needed money for equipment, decided to have a Rummage and Bake Sale. Assisted by their mothers and with a lot of knocking on doors and

sorting of old clothes and donations they had a success.

Then they went looking for sponsors. The Oshawa Group was contacted and donated the funds for sweaters for their team which is called Towers-Food City (Simpson).

When they had difficulty finding teams to play against, they put paid advertisements into the local newspapers and came up with approximately one hundred players (8 teams) between 14-17 years of age, who like themselves were not content to sit around all Summer with nothing, or little, to do.

Thus, the Metro Toronto Ball-Hockey League was formed.

Next, the problem of rink space ... They contacted the Commissioner of Parks and solicited the assistance of the Dept. of Parks. A very able Mr. Coulter there gave the boys direction that resulted in space being arranged. Withrow Park rink in the East end and Campbell Park rink in the West for Saturdays and Sundays all Summer. They have prepared a schedule where both rinks are well utilized.

Each player pays \$5.00 for the season for miscellaneous expenses. Residue will go toward the League banquet (complete with trophies) planned for sometime in September.

Some of the teams came up readily with sponsors, but a few of them are without team sweaters and perhaps some of the readers of this story, in particular those with companies or stores, or perhaps those who just have a few extra dollars and want to put it into "a lot of satisfaction" would sponsor a team for sweaters, or a donation of a trophy for the banquet. It would be well appreciated.

Please bear in mind that, any and all, arrangement, and scheduling of games, footwork and telephone calls, has been done without the assistance of adults. The only outside or adult help comes from offers (not yet accepted) of some adult refereeing and, from Mrs. Gaspari who is the League secretary on a volunteer basis.

It goes without saying that these boys should have the recognition they so rightfully deserve for being energetic and constructive enough to get an idea and stick with it. They have a well organized Ball-Hockey League of which they can be proud to say "the kids did it"

SOCCA seeks foot patrols

A community meeting will be held in late August or early September between residents of the South of Carlton area and local police.

The purpose of the meeting will be to discuss growing concern by residents over inadequate police protection for the South of Carlton area.

A letter sent to Deputy Police Chief Murray by Elsie Norton, Chairwoman of South of Carlton Community Action states, "There have been a number of muggings of elderly men going to the beer store at Seaton and Gerrard streets, especially on days when pension and welfare cheques are issued. When these men have attempted to resist their assailants they have been beaten with belts with large buckles.

In her letter, Mrs. Norton states that although the area is heavily patrolled by police cruisers, it is still underprotected.

"SOCCA believes it is essential to have policemen in pairs patrolling the area on foot. We are especially concerned about protection of back yards and alleys, where scuffles in dark, poorly lit places often can be easily overlooked, from a car driving by.

The letter concludes by adding that more paired police patrols would promote greater contact and understanding between police and area residents to the betterment of both.

Housing repairs failing

The South of Carlton Working Committee's sub-committee on "Housing Improvements" has about given up dealing with the City Housing Inspection Department to improve sub-standard housing in their area.

The sub-committee has found that the Housing Standards Division of the City can only function properly if a landlord is willing to make the necessary repairs.

If he decides not to make repairs, he can practically beat the system as it is presently set up.

The sub-committee has discovered that:

- To improve property through a housing inspection program is a slow
 - It takes a long time for a case to be taken to court.
- It takes a long time for a court decision to be made the same case could be adjourned several times.
- Fines are never the same, because the court judges are never the same. • Its cheaper to pay the fine (\$50 to \$200) than to do the repairs.

And once a case has gone through court, the whole cumbersome. unsatisfactory procedure has to be started all over again.

Plans to re-develop factory

A working committee of Don Vale residents has been set up to help Apple Developments arrive at a scheme acceptable to the community for the Sleepmaster Factory property.

The Sleepmaster site runs from Spruce street through to Gerrard, east of Parliament and west of Sackville street. The Working Committee is made up of residents from that immediate area and consists of Bill and Polly Evans, Chris and Suzanne McKie, Adam and Rebecca Sisler; Jessie Van Kane, Gladys E. Hunt, Madeline Bartley, Jim and Mif Lorimer, Chris Biggs and Norman MacDonald.

Prelininary plans call for five apartments in the existing building on the Spruce street frontage. A path would run through an arch in the building toward Gerrard past seven west-facing townhouses to seven more townhouses at the south end of th site.

Each house would be 14 feet wide, 31 feet long and about 31 feet high, with an enclosed back yard. All parking would be underground, and there would be a common green area on the west side of the main path.

Under this plan, the mattress factory would look much as it did when it was the Trinity College Medical school, with the paint removed to reveal the patterned brick underneath.
